★ **Checkpoint S:** Graduate School of Business

- *Monument to Change as a Verb* - This piece is built by Peter Wegner. He also did the colorful, “flip digit” piece called Monument to Change. Be sure to stand still and watch that piece too! In this piece, there are 300 glossy black panels lit with LEDs from behind. Each panel is printed with an adverb that can be used to modify the verb “change.”

★ **Checkpoint T:** Meyer Green

- Meyer Green is 2.45 acres of open space and is a Stanford favorite for friends to get together for a picnic, star-gazing, dance-offs, and more.

★ **Checkpoint A:** White Plaza (White Memorial Fountain)

- This fountain was made by the sculptor Aristides Demetrios in 1964. Having 65 jets, the powerful fountain blows a cool mist when the wind picks up and also provides the perfect place for students to cool off on hot days. Some students even bring a kayak to the fountain to float in and relax while getting misted by the cool water!

★ **Checkpoint N:** Main Quad (Memorial Church)

- The 17-acre Main Quad is the heart of Stanford and the oldest part of the university. Main Quad has endured 2 earthquakes, but it still stands strong to this day with its beautiful architecture and iconic Roman columns. At Main Quad, each year's graduating class buries a time capsule and marks it with their year's plaque.

★ **Checkpoint F:** Science and Engineering Quad

- *Pars pro Toto* by Alicja Kwade - Before reading on, ask your adult what “pars pro toto” means! This title refers to all of the stone orbs you see scattered about the Quad.
- **Kid's Eyes Only!** - Did your adult know the definition of “pars pro toto”? If not, here's the answer, just for you: It means “a part representing the whole.” Now, go tell everybody so they know who's the smartest!

★ **Checkpoint O:** Branner Earth Sciences Library (Mineral Collection)

- Hours of Operation: (Open Thursday 9 AM - 7 PM and Friday 9 AM - 5 PM, **CLOSED Saturdays**)
- **Adults** - Located on the 2nd floor of the Mitchell Earth Sciences building, adjacent to the Main Quad and Geology Corner. Entrance may be gained from either side of the building. The mineral collection is primarily on the second floor. An elevator is available to take patrons to the library entrance on the 2nd floor. A power-equipped accessible entrance is located on the south side of the building.

★ **Checkpoint R:** Terman Fountain

- Terman Fountain is a fan favorite and a key stop in the Stanford tradition of fountain hopping. The shallow pool and set of 4 water jets provide a perfect opportunity to splash your feet and cool off on a hot day!

★ **Checkpoint D:** Papua New Guinea Sculpture Garden

- Welcome to the secret garden! Many of these sculptures tell stories about the creation and origins of the people of Papua New Guinea, especially the Kwoma and Iatmul societies of the Middle Sepik River region. One story tells how a river there was formed from the tears of a crocodile. Cry me a river!
