Dear Chair Christian:

We, the undersigned 157 organizations representing tens of thousands of New Yorkers, commend the Public Service Commission and Department of Public Service staff for your efforts to correct the many challenges facing the state's signature energy efficiency and building electrification initiative, New Efficiency: New York (NENY). We appreciate this opportunity to offer our comments.

Energy efficiency should be the cornerstone of the state's approach to its energy policy. Moreover, New York needs a holistic approach to investing in our buildings and our communities. Given that buildings are our state's largest source of greenhouse gas emissions and a major source of air pollution, NENY is foundational to equitable achievement of the greenhouse gas and pollution emissions mandates central to the state's Climate Act.

Our homes are where we shelter from the elements, where we gather with family and friends, and where we tuck our children into bed at night. All New Yorkers deserve to live in safe, healthy, buildings that provide comfortable shelter. Yet keeping our homes safe and comfortable is beyond the means of a large percentage of New York households.

If reimagined and thoughtfully implemented, the five billion dollar NENY program offers our greatest opportunity to lower the bills of energy insecure households, improve health, safety and resiliency, and address long standing equity issues in our housing and energy sectors. Existing programs are seemingly designed so that only the easiest to retrofit homes get assistance, and millions of more challenging buildings and their residents are left behind, thereby deepening existing inequities.

The July 20, 2023, Order Directing Energy Efficiency and Building Electrification Proposals introducing the Strategic Framework was an urgently needed course correction to make better use of ratepayer money. However, our organizations are deeply concerned about the potential for continued underperformance of these programs in low-and-moderate income (LMI) households and disadvantaged communities (DACs), the lack of resources needed to meet the scale of decarbonization and electrification necessary to achieve the goals of the CLCPA, and the lack of transparency and accountability for how program administrators will engage participants and deliver effective programs to LMI households and DACs.

We urge any subsequent actions and implementation orders from the Commission to center the following priorities. A successful NENY program should accomplish the following:

- Invest In Our Communities by allocating 50% of the overall NENY budget to LMI households and DAC programs, prioritizing structural barrier removal and building shell improvements.
 - Expand 1-4 family and multifamily programs to cover more improvements, including pre-weatherization and heat pumps, and right-size grants so they reflect today's costs.
 - Use "LMI and DAC first" neighborhood scale approaches that reduce system costs and improve affordability by leveraging electrification capacity maps directed in the July 2023 Order to target strategic electrification and efficiency investments in LMI communities and DACs.
 - Double the job training targets to meet the needs for efficiency in DACs through local hiring.
 - Create a plan to use funds from the Inflation Reduction Act, New York
 Cap-and-Invest, and other state resources in coordination with NENY funds to
 dramatically scale the number of units retrofitted, the depth of interventions, and
 the amount of barrier reduction to energy efficiency and electrification in LMI and
 DACs.
- Make the Programs Easy to Use and meet people where they are.
 - Make applications simple, standardize incentives, and speed up approval so that when building owners decide to or need to act, they can address their needs in a timely manner (e.g., address emergency situations, substantial renovations)
 - Create an "all-roads-lead-to platform" for accessing program information and applications that provides a painless experience for customers and contractors
 - Collaboratively design and field-test programs with the communities that will use them so that they are intuitive, accessible, and user friendly.
- Value Our Lives, Our Health, Our Comfort, Our Safety by incorporating health and other benefits into the calculations that inform investment decisions.
 - Quantify the benefits of removing lead, mold, asbestos, and other hazards as part of energy efficiency retrofits.
 - Quantify the health impacts of improvements to indoor air quality that result from energy efficiency retrofits and electrification.
 - Quantify the health improvements from access to cooling, ventilation, and air filtration.

NENY was originally developed before New York's Climate Law was enacted. With new mandates and new Commissioners, you have the opportunity and the responsibility to reimagine NENY as not merely a program to be administered, but as an investment in our people and our future. It is essential as we move into the next phase of NENY that you hold NYSERDA and the utilities accountable to our communities' evolving needs for an inclusive clean energy economy. We are ready to be your partners in this process.
