## Section 3 – Why People Consider Relocating to Houston County

Households explore relocation to Middle Georgia for a variety of reasons, including:

- Desire for lower housing costs
- Rising insurance or living expenses elsewhere
- Employment changes or remote work flexibility
- Military reassignment or proximity to Robins AFB
- Preference for a less congested, more moderate-paced region

## Section 6 – Taxes, Insurance & Financial Considerations

State Income Tax

- Georgia applies a flat income tax rate (verify current rates with the Georgia Department of Revenue)
- Florida does not levy a state income tax

Property Taxes

- Georgia offers homestead exemptions for qualifying primary residences
- Rates vary by county and municipality

## Insurance

- Home and auto insurance costs vary by provider and individual risk factors
- Many households report differences compared to coastal or high-density markets

## Vehicle Registration

- Georgia vehicle registration fees are generally lower than some states' initial registration costs

All tax and insurance details should be verified through official state and provider sources.

## Section 7 – Housing Options & Timing Realities

Housing decisions depend on:

- Budget
- Timeline
- Employment or PCS orders
- Desired flexibility

Some households rent first to learn the area. Others purchase immediately when preparation and timing align. Temporary housing or short overlaps are common during transitions.

There is no universally correct approach – planning flexibility matters more than speed.

(How to Research & Verify)

- Verify school zoning by address
- Confirm enrollment and transfer requirements

- Georgia Department of Education
- Houston County School District

- TRICARE or VA resources (if applicable)

## Section 9 – Preparing for a Move: Practical Planning Checklist

### Before Leaving Your Current Location

- Provide notice to landlord or prepare home for sale
- Submit USPS address change
- Transfer medical, school, and veterinary records
- Schedule utility cancellations or transfers
- Obtain moving quotes or authorize PCS/PPM if applicable

### After Arrival in Georgia

- Obtain Georgia driver's license
- Register vehicles with the county tax office
- Set up utilities based on address
- Establish local medical and pharmacy care
- Update voter registration if applicable

## Section 10 – The First 30–60 Days After Arrival

Most households experience a stabilization period after arrival. Common priorities include:

- Finalizing utilities and services
- Completing administrative tasks
- Establishing routines
- Allowing time to learn the area

Adjustment often happens in phases rather than all at once.

## Section 11 – Community Life & Lifestyle Adjustment

Community connection develops gradually. Many families begin with:

- Libraries and community programs
- Parks and recreation departments
- Local events and informal routines

There is no expectation to engage immediately. Familiarity builds over time.

## Section 12 – Military & PCS-Related Considerations (If Applicable)

For military households, relocation may overlap with:

- PCS orders
- Household goods movement
- Administrative and reporting timelines

Official guidance should always be verified through:

- Command leadership
- TMO / Personal Property Office
- Military OneSource
- Installation support offices

This guide supplements – not replaces – official military resources.

## Section 13 – Questions to Ask Before You Decide

- What monthly expenses matter most to our household?
