argues in "The Great Climate Flip-Flop" that if the world does not make changes to combat global warming, the climate could ultimately "flip-flop" into an ice age. Ken Caldeira in "The Great Climate Experiment" considers mankind's acts as contributing to global warming and resulting in devastation to the world, but he sees a different end result. He asserts that if we continue to dump carbon into the environment, global warming will increase about 5 to 10 degrees Celsius, causing the flooding of islands, the death of sea life and risk the extinction of man as well(1). While scientists disagree what the result of the current global warming situation might be, they agree that global disasters are imminent if mankind does not change it's irresponsible consumption of world resources.
