# Formal Letter Basics

**There are five parts of every business letter:**

**HEADING:** where you put your address and the date.

**INSIDE ADDRESS:** where you put the name and address of the company you are writing to.

**GREETING:** where you put the greeting and the name of the person you are writing too

**BODY:** where you write your message.

**SIGNATURE:** where you sign your first name and family name and also type it underneath.

*(The letter should be in the center of page, from top to bottom)*

### **BODY**

*(Your Body should be several paragraphs, skip a line between paragraphs)*

Thank you for taking the time to read my letter, President Lai. I hope you will consider my ideas, and I look forward to seeing progress on this issue soon.

Dear President Lai:

*(In the body of your business letter you do not need to indent, but you must skip a line after each paragraph.)*

**First paragraph:** Introduce yourself and the reason why you are writing. Tell who you are and any **important** background information. Share details related to the problem you want to discuss. Tell him that you are writing about a problem you would like fixed in the city.

**Middle paragraphs:** After your introduction, you say what you want to say. You are free to say anything you want, but remember to be polite, even if what you want to say is not very nice. You should introduce the problem you would like the president to fix. You should explain why it is a problem and persuade him to take action. You should also give some ideas for solutions. **Remember to start a new paragraph for new topics.** You should have at least two paragraphs here.

**Last paragraph:** This is your closing. You want to thank the president for his time and for reading your letter. You also want to ask the mayor again to consider your request or complaint, take action, and you should ask for a reply.

Dear President Tsai:

My name is Twinkle Chou. I live in Taipei, Taiwan. I am a student in Fuhsing Elementary School. I am twelve years old, which is a sixth grade student. There are four members in my family. I have a sister in high school. I am writing to you today to share with you a concern I have about the education in Taiwan. I hope you can take a few minutes to read my letter and consider what I have to say.

My sister and I get up at seven o'clock, and we'll get to school at seven-twenty every morning. Most of the students in Taiwan get up early to go to school. When we get up early in the morning, sometimes we can't concentrate in our classes. Lots of students in Taiwan have after school classes. When we get home, we need to finish our homework. After that work, we must review for our school work and tests. But there's not enough time for us. Sometimes, high school students need to stay up late for reviewing, but they still need to get up early for school the next day. When they are staying up late and getting up early for school, they can't concentrate in classes. They may also fail the tests in the morning. There are also lots of subjects and tests for students in Taiwan. Some parents and teachers think points on test show you are smart, that you are good at school work. But I think tests can just show we are good at memorizing things. They show nothing true about us.

While I'm not an expert, and I don't actually know how to fix the problem, I have some advice here. I think you can change the time that students get to school from seven-twenty to nine-thirty. We will have the same amount of class time but just make the time students get to school later. For tests, you could talk to schools and discuss to put more activities that can make us think, not just make us have tests all the time. For example, interesting math questions that aren't in our textbook would be a good way to let us think. It also isn't too boring for us.

Thank you very much for your time. I hope you can consider my advice. I look forward to your reply and seeing you continue work hard to make Taiwan a better place.
