

## Gramática

Hay (yay yay) (Ch.1a2). The Spanish word **hay** is used when saying “there is” or “there are”. **No hay** means “there is not” or “there are not” and **¿Hay . . .** asks the question, “Is there . . .?” or “Are there . . .?” as in, “*Is there love to be found in this life for me?*” or “*Are there nunchucks on the table?*”

### Examples:

-¿Cuántos estudiantes hay en la clase? (How many students are there in the class?)

-Hay quince. (There are 15.)

-¿Hay elefantes? (Are there elephants?)

-No hay elefantes, pero hay monos. (There aren't any elephants, but there are monkeys).

## Actividades
