This template can be used for multiple purposes:

• It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA)

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated Primary PE and sport premium guidance.

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. Meeting National Curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.

Priority should always be given to ensuring that pupils can perform safe self-rescue even if they do not fully meet the first two requirements of the National Curriculum programme of study

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?		The Year 6 cohort is new to the school other than 1 of 3 students. These students have not engaged in consistent learning in previous settings and have posed too high a risk to take part in all activities. The Juniors provision has struggled to secure the transport to and from the swimming venue.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	0%	Students are able to swim but they are not competent.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?		Our students' have had risk assessments around out of school learning and have not consistently taken part in formal swimming sessions in previous settings.
