

The differences is the red circling the roman numeral, in this case it is 1. The species is under the differences, in this case the red circling the number 4. Now that we know the genus, which is trans. General or just general, the difference which is 1, and the species which is 4, we can draw the figure. However species 4 refers to NAME. To refer to PERSON, we add a circle or "o" to the left end of the figure.



The Differences are to be affixed unto that end which is on the lest fide of the Character, according to this order;

The Species should be affixed at the other end of the Character according to the like order.
