Global Studies: Grade 6

Students will continue study of global issues with units on health, the environment, and human migration. Coursework will include sharing daily research with peers and debating current events and global politics. The semester course will end with a project and presentation exploring the complicated problems of globalization, paired with reflections on the effects of globalization on various regions of the world.

Participation: Most of our classes, we'll be discussing new ideas together in a variety of ways, trying to figure out where we stand on various issues. You are expected to participate in these discussions regularly, and to do so in a respectful manner and according to classroom expectations. Participation will be recorded by the teacher through observation of engagement in small groups, and in larger group discussions.

Classwork Assignments: Many days in class there will be at least one assignment on Google Classroom—a discussion question, a poll, a reading guide, or other assignment. You are expected to complete these assignments to the best of your ability, while following directions carefully, drawing upon your discussions with your peers, readings, and videos.

Projects: At the end of units, you will be given an opportunity, by yourself or with a small group, to show what you have learned or display your research to your peers.
