Course Objectives This course is intended to introduce students to the concepts of

environmental toxicology in the context of public health.

Toxicology is the science that deals with the health effects that can result from exposure to chemical, biological, and physical agents

in the environment.

Class Format & Materials Needed:

This course is a face-to-face, on-campus format. Students enrolled will attend class on-campus.

Course Description

In this course students will learn about major occupational safety and health hazard in in the workplace and across several industrial sectors. In addition, students learn how to evaluate exposure, assess prevent and control hazards related to mechanical systems, falling, impact, acceleration, temperature extremes, pressure, electricity, fire, industrial hygiene, confined spaces, radiation, noise and vibration, and blood-borne pathogens.

Course Rationale

Explain the historical impact of the safety and health movement; and interpret and summarize safety and health standards based on student-conducted research.

Prerequisites

Course prerequisites include ACC requirements of reading, writing and math proficiency as demonstrated by The Texas Success Initiative, or proof of exemption or waiver.

Distance Education

This course is an online format. Students will use the Blackboard learning management system for assignment instructions, submitting assignments, and collaboration.

Transferability of workforce courses varies. Students interested in transferring courses to another college should speak with their Area of Study (AoS) advisor, Department Chair, and/or Program Director.

GRADING POLICY

Grades for the course will be based on the following:

Course Grade = 400 Total Possible Points From:

200 points – 5 Exams (50 points each); lowest exam score is automatically dropped.

200 points – End of chapter review questions (40 points each chapter review for chapters 14,15,16,20 & 22)

Five exams will be given during the semester, of which the four highest will count toward the final course grade (thus students may drop their lowest exam grade – only one!) The course will be graded on a standard grade scale (70- 79% = "C"; 80-89%= "B", etc.). There will be no large curve at the end of the course to drastically alter averages and "save the day". Regardless of how convincing the arguments or how much you feel you deserve it, I do not "give" grades not earned. I simply do the math at the end of the semester and what you earned is your final grade.

Exam Structure: Each exam is 20 questions (20 exam questions (each worth 5 points). The exams required solving quantitative and qualitative problems and may contain multiple-choice and matching type questions. The tests are timed and generally you will be given 40 minutes to complete exams. Each exam is a standalone measure of how well you have learned the material covered in the designated chapters. When appropriate, and related to the material covered, questions from previous exams may be included on subsequent exams. The final exam is not comprehensive, but the material does build on itself, so don't clear your memory after each exam!

Final Exam: The final exam must be taken to pass the course.

No Makeup Exams: There are no makeup exams – If you miss an exam, your grade will be calculated using the four exams you take (four exams are the minimum number required to pass the class).

Incompletes: An instructor may award a grade of "I" (Incomplete) if a student is unable to take the final examination or complete an end-of-the-semester assignment, due to extenuating circumstances, such as death of a loved one or illness. A student must request an incomplete in writing with documentation of the circumstances justifying it. The student must complete the examination or assignment by a date set by the instructor. This date shall not be later than the course withdrawal deadline in the subsequent semester.

Students may request an Incomplete from their faculty member if they believe circumstances warrant. The faculty member will determine whether the Incomplete is appropriate to award or not. The following processes must be followed when awarding a student an I grade.

- Prior to the end of the semester in which the "I" is to be awarded, the student must meet with the instructor to determine the assignments and exams that must be completed prior to the deadline date. This meeting can occur virtually or in person. The instructor should complete the Report of Incomplete Grade form.
- 2. The faculty member will complete the form, including all requirements to complete the course and the due date, sign (by typing in name) and then email it to the student. The student will then complete his/her section, sign (by typing in name), and return the completed form to the faculty member to complete the agreement. A copy of the fully completed form can then be emailed by the faculty member to the student and the department chair for each grade of Incomplete that the faculty member submits at the end of the semester.
- 3. The student must complete all remaining work by the date specified on the form above. This date is determined by the instructor in collaboration with the student, but it may not be later than the final withdrawal deadline in the subsequent long semester.
- 4. Students will retain access to the course Blackboard page through the subsequent semester in order to submit work and complete the course. Students will be able to log on to Blackboard and have access to the course section materials, assignments, and grades from the course and semester in which the Incomplete was awarded.
- 5. When the student completes the required work by the Incomplete deadline, the instructor will submit an electronic Grade Change Form to change the student's performance grade from an "I" to the earned grade of A, B, C, D, or F.

If an Incomplete is not resolved by the deadline, the grade automatically converts to an "F." Approval to carry an Incomplete for longer than the following semester or session deadline is not frequently granted."

Withdrawals: Any student who withdraws from a class has the responsibility to ensure that their name is removed from the roll. The instructor does, however, reserve the right to withdraw a student should he or she feel it is necessary. A student who decides to withdraw must verify that the withdrawal is submitted before the Final Withdrawal Date. The student is also strongly encouraged to retain their copy of the withdrawal form for their records.

COURSE POLICIES

Attendance/Class Participation

Regular and timely class participation in discussions and completion of work is expected of all students. If attendance or compliance with other course policies is unsatisfactory, the instructor may withdraw students from the class.

Withdrawal Policy

It is the responsibility of each student to ensure that his or her name is removed from the rolls should they decide to withdraw from the class. The instructor does, however, reserve the right to drop a student should he or she feel it is necessary. If a student decides to withdraw, he or she should also verify that the withdrawal is recorded <u>before</u> the Final Withdrawal Date. **Check the official ACC academic calendar for information on the final withdrawal date**. The student is also strongly encouraged to keep any paperwork in case a problem arises.

Students are responsible for understanding the impact that withdrawal from a course may have on their financial aid, veterans' benefits, and international student status. Per state law, students enrolling for the first time in Fall 2007 or later at any public Texas college or university may not withdraw (receive a "W") from more than six courses during their undergraduate college education. Some exemptions for good cause could allow a student to withdraw from a course without having it count toward this limit. Students are strongly encouraged to meet with an advisor when making decisions about course selection, course loads, and course withdrawals.

Wise Advice: If you are having trouble (more than one exam is below the grade level you are happy with) or have any questions, seek help from me immediately. Don't wait until the last weeks of the semester, or the last test, to become "concerned" - it will do no good.

Keep up with the reading. Read the chapters before the test is posted.

Studying for exams: 1). Reread the chapter. 2). Review the bold terms in the chapters as well as all figures: 3). Answer the review questions at the end of each chapter. (Repeat as needed.)
