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Statement From Governor Mann on Executive Order 06

RALEIGH, Greater Appalachia — Today, Governor Goog Mann released the following statement after authorizing an executive order placing a moratorium on all evictions:

"Two days ago I used the powers vested in myself to put an end to all evictions throughout the Commonwealth. For too long landlords have had the ability to throw the lives of Greater Appalachians into disarray on a whim, pushing them out of residences they know as home. Since day one of my Governorship I have prided myself on being a leader for the working class, and the vast majority of tenants are either low income or working class individuals. Now, unless there's a clear and present danger to people's lives or property, nobody in Greater Appalachia will be evicted. I don't intend for this to be permanent, because my executive order isn't a permanent solution, but a long term answer to our housing crisis is now out there. Earlier today my Administration sent the [HOUSING Act](#) to the legislative docket, the second time my Administration has done so this term. Governor Mann is committed to solving the housing crisis and guaranteeing that every resident of this state is able to acquire the housing they're entitled to. This act will not only restrict the powers of landlords but seek to create housing for the 50,000 homeless Greater Appalachians, I'll give a more in depth explanation at a later date. Tenants in the Commonwealth should rejoice and landlords should quiver in fear that there's someone sympathetic to the issues negatively affecting the common man in the Governor's Mansion. My Administration will work closely with the Speaker of the Assembly to see that my bill passes the legislature and lands on my desk for signing. To put it all simply: When the HOUSING Act passes, my executive order will be rescinded. Let's get to work."
