AVID Senior Seminar School Analysis Prompt

Review your Junior Binders and conduct additional research as needed on 10 schools that you feel are your matches. Identify 1 - "safety school", 7 - "strong match schools", and 2 - "stretch" schools.

Write a short 1-2 page analysis for each school that where you synthesize multiple sources (school's website, californiacolleges.edu, collegboard.org, collegescorecard.gov, family connection etc.) demonstrating understanding of the subject under investigation. *Analyze* the school's *average GPA, SAT and/or ACT scores* and explain why this school might be an *academic match*. In addition, *analyze* the various *majors/programs* offered and explain how the school is a *major match*. As part of your analysis, choose any of the following aspects that are important to you and *discuss* how they *influenced your decision*. Consider exploring and explaining how the following aspects of your school do or do not match your specific needs...

- Learning Environment (Student to Teacher Ratios, Impacted Majors etc.)
- Geographic Location
- Type of School (Size, Public or Private, Religious Affiliation etc).
- Sports, Clubs, and/or Extracurricular Activities.
- Tuition/Fees and Financial Support
- Demographics and Diversity
- Selectivity (Open admission, Less selective, Somewhat selective, Very selective, Most selective).
- Admission Options (Early Action, Early Decision).
- etc.
