

Visa Application Tips

Visa applications can be tedious and long. It is crucial that you do everything you can to ensure the process goes smoothly. These are some tips to help you make the process smoother.

Prepare for delays

The CANADA. Citizenship and Immigrations Services (formerly INS) is extremely well-backed up. You can ensure that you get a Visa when you need it. Make your application well in advance. To avoid adverse legal action, it is important that you apply as soon as you arrive in the CANADA. if you are already in the country.

Avoid summary removal

Border officials hold a lot of power. If they feel you pose a threat to security or have suspected that you have lied in order to obtain your visa, they can send you back home. These officials will need to be convinced that you are worthy of your visa when you arrive from overseas. If you are visiting the country as a tourist, and do not plan to apply for

citizenship, you should avoid bringing any items that could give the impression that you will be staying.

Notify the CANADA. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS).

You must notify the USCIS within 10 days if you're in the United States more than 30 days. Each member of your family must send separate notifications. You have two options to send this notification. The best is to go online and click on the "online address change service" button. Or, you can mail Form AR-11. It is also a good idea to inform every USCIS office handling your application of your address change.

Multiple Petitions for Visa

If you're applying for a green card through your family member, and more than one family member is eligible to submit the petition on your behalf, each member should submit one petition. You have an alternative option if you are unable to wait for a particular category or if the person who submitted it for you is no longer available.

Pay attention to Deadlines

You must be on time for all appointments with the USCIS, CANADA. Embassy or consulate, or CANADA. Immigration Court. You could end up being deported if you show up late or don't show at all.

Avoid Violations

Make sure to read the fine print and follow the rules. You can be deported or your visa could be cancelled if you break even one of the terms.

Keep track and make copies

The USCIS is notorious for losing paperwork. Send all paperwork and applications via certified mail. Make copies. This document will serve as proof of filing and may be used to file any additional copies if the USCIS loses your originals.
