A Note from our Health Office:

We have Pertussis, commonly known as Whooping cough, in the community. Pertussis presents itself with cold like symptoms and an annoying cough. The cough may develop into coughing spells where it is difficult to catch your breath. People who are infected with Pertussis may not have an elevated temperature. Since the symptoms initially present themselves as a mild cold and cough, a contagious person may not be aware for several weeks that they have Pertussis. Symptoms usually present 10 days after being exposure.

Being up to date with your Tdap immunization usually prevents the disease. Follow up with your doctor to make sure you do not need a Tdap booster. Practicing proper hygiene, such as washing your hands throughout the day, will help prevent the spread of the disease. Cover your mouth when coughing or sneezing.

Do not hesitate to follow up with your doctor if you are coughing. The test for Pertussis is a simple swab from your nose. Antibiotics will be prescribed for each confirmed case and for all family members or individuals in close contact. A person diagnosed with Pertussis should stay out of school until they have completed their antibiotics. Please notify the health office if a case of Pertussis is confirmed.
