Directions:

- 1. Schedule a 30 minute meeting with your TA advisor for May 3rd. Invite your parents or guardians to that meeting and anyone else you would like to have attend.

Plan to present your chosen materials for about 10 minutes and then be prepared to help lead the discussion for the remainder of the time. Being prepared means having all your materials complete and ready to access, and having reviewed some of the potential questions the group may pose. **Please note, you do NOT have to cover everything in the below checklist during your exhibition, but you do have to complete everything in the checklist, have it ready to access if it comes up in the discussion, and have all required elements checked by your advisor.
- 3. After your exhibition, complete the exhibition reflection form and return the completed reflection to your advisor for eligibility for next year's privileges.

Purpose & Privileges

Purpose: To Connect, Reflect, & Share.

Connect

Making connections in our learning community helps to deepen our relationships and expand opportunities for collaboration. Taking the time to reflect also provides the chance to connect ideas and learning for the year.

Reflect

With the pace of modern day school and life, it can be challenging to take the time to consciously reflect on progress, challenges, and opportunities. Exhibition allows for dedicated reflection on learning progress over the course of the past year.

Share

The opportunity to share gives you the chance to showcase your work. Too often academic progress, perseverance, and products go uncelebrated and some aspects go unexamined. Exhibition also allows you to practice preparing an explanation of your own products and skills for an audience, an important skill to hone for the 21st century.

Privileges:

By completing all aspects of the exhibition at a proficient level (determined by your TA advisor) you will be placed on a list of students **eligible** for 2016/2017 student privileges. Being eligible **will not guarantee** privileges for the 2016/2017 year as a parent/guardian permission slip will be required for 2016/2017 and the student must remain in good academic and administrative standing.

 10th grade privileges will allow qualifying students to be free to move about on-campus (library, cafeteria, no-disruptive hall or classroom spaces, outside courtyard with permission) during unscheduled blocks.

•	11th grade privileges will allow for qualifying students to be free to have the above on-campus privileges as well as off-campus privileges during unscheduled blocks (additional qualifications such as signing in and out will exist).

- 3. Can you think of an example where your community (school, home, or otherwise) supported you to help you succeed on something this year?
- 4. What value can you determine in your work at school this year?¹
- 5. In what ways has this year challenged you so far?
- 6. Is there something (at school or otherwise) in the past year that you are proud of?
- 7. What have you learned about yourself this year?
- 8. Can you identify any learning obstacles that you are working on overcoming?
- 9. What is a habit of learning that you want to improve upon for next year?
- 10. Is there something that you are looking forward to learning about?
- 11. If you could learn about anything, what would it be?
- 12. Are you aware of the flexible pathway options available to you? (Early College, Dual Enrollment, Online Learning, Community-Based Learning, Central Vermont Career Center).
