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Introduction (required)

This section should begin by providing an overview of the research topic. The author should explain the issue or problem that is the focus of the research, why it is important, and how the topic is relevant in the broader context of the field of study.

Materials and Method (required)

The Materials and Methods section of a journal article is very important because it explains how the research was conducted, allowing readers to evaluate the validity and reliability of the results and replicate the study. The following are the writing requirements for this section that authors of articles in this journal must follow:

Description of Materials or Research Subjects: Authors should provide details about the materials or subjects used in the research. If the research involves chemicals, devices, or specific tools, their complete specifications should be included. If the research subjects are humans or animals, their demographic characteristics and inclusion/exclusion criteria should be described in detail.

Research Design: The research design should be clearly and structurally explained. This includes the type of research conducted (e.g., experimental, quasi-experimental, survey, case study), as well as sampling methods and group allocation, if relevant.

Research Procedure: The steps or procedures followed in the research should be described in detail and chronologically. This includes every stage taken during the experiment or data collection. The author should ensure that each step is described in sufficient detail so that readers can understand and replicate the research.

Instruments and Equipment: All instruments or equipment used in the research must be described. Include technical specifications, models, and manufacturers if relevant. If using existing instruments, be sure to provide references and validation of their use in the context of the research.

Data Collection Methods: Describe the methods used to collect data. These may include surveys, interviews, observations, tests, or other measurement tools. Be sure to include information about the validity and reliability of the data collection tools, if available.

Data Analysis: Details of the data analysis methods should be included. Explain the statistical techniques or other analysis methods used to interpret the data. If specific software was used for data analysis, include the name and version of the software.

Research Ethics: If the research involves human or animal subjects, include a statement regarding the ethical approval obtained. Explain how ethical principles were followed in conducting the research.

Results (required)

The **Results** section presents the main findings of the study without further interpretation or discussion. This section should be clearly and systematically organised so that readers can easily understand the results obtained. The following are the writing requirements for the Results section that must be followed by authors of articles in this journal:

Presentation of Data in a Concise and Clear Manner:

1. Present data that is relevant to the research objectives.
2. Avoid presenting irrelevant or excessive data.

Use of Tables and Figures:

1. Use tables and images to present complex data in a more easily understandable way.
2. Tables and figures should be numbered and clearly titled.
3. Each table and figure must be referenced in the text and accompanied by a brief explanation.

Description of Results:

1. Describe the main findings.
2. Use text to highlight important points from tables and images.
3. Avoid interpretation or discussion of the results in this section; focus on presenting the data.

Consistency and Clarity:

1. Use a consistent format for all tables and figures.
2. Ensure that all terms, units, and symbols are explained and used consistently.
3. The writing must be clear and free from ambiguity.

Data Grouping:

1. Group the results based on the main variables or categories that have been determined in the research method.
2. If there are several experiments or analyses, separate the results into relevant subsections.

Statistics and Significance:

1. Present statistical analysis results clearly, including p-values, confidence intervals, and effect sizes where relevant. Be sure to mention the statistical significance level used.

Discussion (required)

The Discussion section of an article in the journal Public Health Research Development is the section that analyses and interprets the results of the research, explains the implications of the findings, and relates them to previous research. This section also includes the limitations of the research and suggestions for future research. The following are the writing requirements for the Discussion section that must be followed by authors of articles in this journal:

Interpretation of Results:

1. Explain what the research results mean and how they support or contradict the initial hypothesis.

2. Compare the results of the research with relevant previous studies.
3. Avoid repeating results already presented in the Results section; focus on interpretation and implications.

Research Implications:

1. Discuss the practical and theoretical implications of the research findings.
2. Explain how the research results can be used in public health practice or policy.

Research limitations:

1. State the limitations in the research design, methods, or analysis that may affect the validity and generalisation of the findings.
2. Discuss how these limitations can be overcome in future research.

Conclusions(required)

The **Conclusion** section of a journal article in " International Conference on Environmental Health " is the final section that summarises the main findings of the research and provides clear conclusions and the relevance of the research.

In compiling references for this journal, all authors are required to follow the IEEE (Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers) reference writing style. References used must come from primary data published within the last 7 years, such as scientific journals, conferences, books, or reliable academic sources. Each article submitted must include at least 20 references relevant to the research topic.

In the text, references should be written in square brackets, in the order in which they appear. For example, if you refer to one source, write [1]. If you refer to several sources at once, separate the numbers with commas, for example [1], [3], [5]. In the reference list, all references should be arranged in the order in which they appear in the text. Here are some examples of reference formats for various types of sources, according to IEEE style:
