• p 307, after the last paragraph, ending "...but can never be certain," append the following: Kant, the anti-empiricist, argued the contrary position that *a priori* knowledge about the world, called synthetic *a priori* knowledge by him, is possible. Put another way, unlike the empiricists, he thought that knowledge of the world with the certainty of deduction (*a priori* knowledge) is possible.
