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| Example: Coach (main character's basketball coach) in Diary of a Part-Time Indian Quote "I believe in you. I look at you out on that court and I see tru promise." (p. 119) | Example argument: Some people don't say much, but their small amount of words or presence are so important in making a difference. Coach is one of the few positive influences in Arnold's life. However, if it were not for his constant presence and small words of encouragement towards the end of the story, Arnold would not have had the presence of mind to stand up and confront his friend Rowdy. He had always taken the lower, more vulnerable position in their friendship, and now through the playing on the team, he was able to see how much leverage and possibility he has to offer to others. He didn't always see this and the coaches gently nudging him to take risks helped him to see this. The coach's advice also helped Arnold to confront his home team after getting beat up. Arnold's character would have fallen without the coaches small, yet important support. He trumps other supporting character's because he cares, doesn't tell the main character what to do, but helps the main character to find his voice by asking questions. |

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Sample Life Lessons / themes offered in books.

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| Example: Theme: Violence should not be a way of life, only a means to an end when necessary "His father is drinking hard and throwing hard punches, so Rowdy and his mother are always walking around with bruised and bloody faces. 'It's war paint,' Rowdy always says. 'It just makes me look tougher.'" - Junior and Rowdy, p. 17 | Example argument: Junior lives under the constant threat of physical violence. Although he attempts to assuage the threat through his drawings and light-hearted approach to the problem, he is nevertheless subjected to regular beatings by members of the reservation, including the adults. But violence serves as a form of communication in the reservation. Junior believes it is the Indian's acknowledgement that they are going nowhere that fuels their violence. Thus, like Rowdy, physical violence is also communicative, but he has to decide how much he wants to adopt violence into his way of life. Towards the end, he decides to shy away with it deciding to take a stand with his words more. |
