How to Use This Guide

This list includes top intentional community directories and social media channels where you can share your openings. For each platform, we've included a short description, a direct link, and tips to help you get the most visibility.

- Share your community's mission, values, and current openings
- Build trust and awareness by showing up in the right places

COMMUNITY DIRECTORIES

Here are some of the best online directories to list your community. These sites are actively used by people searching for intentional living options—from cohousing and ecovillages to income-sharing communes and coliving. It's best to get listed on as many platforms as are a fit for you, so you can build “backlink” credibility to your primary website or social media page.

- ☐ ic.org The most comprehensive directory of intentional communities, run by the Foundation for Intentional Community (FIC). Great for U.S.-based and international

communities alike.

Tip: Place a [classified ad](#) for extra viewership.

Global Ecovillage Network (GEN) directory of sustainability-focused communities around the world.
Tip: Select the right region and tags so your listing appears in relevant searches.
- ☐ searchtinyhousevillages.com
Directory of over 300 tiny house communities.
Tip: Best for land-based communities welcoming tiny homes or offering pad rentals.
- ☐ cohousing.org
The Cohousing Association of the U.S. (CohoUS) features over 300 cohousing communities.
Tip: Add your listing and check out their events to connect with seekers.
- ☐ cohousing.ca
For Canadian cohousing communities.
Tip: Share updates regularly to stay visible to Canadian seekers.

UK Cohousing Network with a directory of 40+ cohousing projects.
Tip: Even if you're not in the UK, check out their resource hub!
- ☐ sagecohoadvocates.org
Senior cohousing directory for those aged 55+ in the U.S. and Canada.
Tip: Emphasize age-inclusive or senior-friendly aspects in your listing.
- ☐ seniorcoops.org
List of 100+ senior co-op communities in the U.S.
Tip: Use clear language for affordability, accessibility, or aging-in-place values.
- ☐ ecobasa.org
A European-focused directory of ecovillages and communities with work-trade options.
Tip: Ideal if you welcome volunteers or travelers.
- ☐ numundo.org
A platform for transformational travel and ecovillage stays, especially in Latin America.
Tip: Add workshops, retreats, or short stays to attract conscious travelers.
- ☐ thefec.org
The Federation for Egalitarian Communities—focus on income-sharing communes.

Tip: Great fit for radical or deeply cooperative communities.

☐ rocosa.org

Directory of over 300 resident-owned mobile home communities.

Tip: Consider listing if your community is structured similarly or focuses on affordability.

☐ nasco.coop

Focuses on student and youth housing co-ops in the U.S. and Canada.

Tip: Mention educational partnerships or age range if your community includes young adults.

☐ coliving.com

Urban-leaning coliving directory with many rental-style listings.

Tip: Use if you offer private rooms, short-term stays, or coliving spaces.

☐ agrihoodliving.com

Directory for farm-focused communities.

Tip: Emphasize your land use, permaculture, or CSA programs.

☐ transitionnetwork.org

Find local transition initiatives and add your community to a global movement for resilience.

Tip: Especially useful if you're open to collaborating or hosting workshops.

☐ diggersanddreamers.org.uk

UK-based network of diverse intentional communities.

Tip: Add a detailed listing and explore their community-building resources.

☐ embassynetwork.com

Experimental community network with a focus on governance and radical hospitality.

Tip: Use if your community is exploring new systems or hosting changemakers.

While primarily for organic farm work exchanges, many intentional communities list here.

Tip: Mention community living aspects clearly in your farm profile.

Directory of homesharing programs in the U.S.—ideal for elder care, co-housing, or simple living arrangements.

Tip: Emphasize values of mutual aid, companionship, or multi-generational living.

FACEBOOK GROUPS & ONLINE COMMUNITIES

Why Facebook Groups?

With tens of thousands of active members across dozens of interest-based and regional groups, Facebook is one of the **most effective (and free!) platforms** to post your openings, share updates, and connect with potential members. All you need is a Facebook account.

 **Tip:** When searching Facebook, try keywords like:
Intentional Community, Ecovillage, Cohousing, Coliving, Communal Living,
Cooperative Housing, Shared Housing, Conscious Community, Regenerative
Village, etc.

Also consider identity-based terms like:

Senior housing, Christian/Jewish/Muslim Community Living, Gay or Lesbian Housing, BIPOC
Intentional Communities, Polyamorous Housing, Vegan Housing

Posting Tips:

- Write a short but heartfelt intro to your community with 1–3 good photos.
- Include a clear call to action: “We’re currently welcoming new members—visit [link] to learn more!”
- Reply to comments and stay engaged. Rotate posts weekly (don’t spam!)
- Rotate where you post weekly—don’t post in all 70+ groups at once.
- Be a human, not a flyer! Include personal stories or quotes from current members.
