

- Mention why it's an ideal company for you.

# Have you accomplished something you didn't know you could handle?

- Present yourself as a fighter, not a quitter.
- Explain the specific actions you took to solved the problems.
- Highlight the positive outcome and what you learned from the experience.

# If you were a car/bird/animal/colour what sort of car/bird/animal/colour would you be?

- Choose what reflects your personality.
- Explain a key characteristic that aligns with you (e.g., "I'd be an eagle because I'm focused and visionary").
- Relate it to your professional strengths or work style.

#### How do you like to be managed?

- Emphasize the importance of clear communication and expectations.
- Mention appreciation for feedback and support for growth.
- Highlight your preference for autonomy and trust.

#### Why did you leave your last job?

- Explain your desire for new challenges and growth opportunities.
- Mention your interest in expanding your skills or pursuing a different industry.
- Highlight your enthusiasm for the new role and how it aligns with your career goals.

#### What should I know that's not on your resume?


- Share a personal story that reflects your work ethic or values.
- Discuss a recent volunteer experience or community involvement.
- Mention a soft skill or personal quality that contributes to team dynamics.

# Do you have any questions?

- Ask about the team dynamics and company culture.
- Inquire about opportunities for professional growth and development.
- Seek clarity on the expectations and key success metrics for the role.

# What would you do if you were in my position?

- You need to show that you can think on the spot.
- Analyze 2-3 challenges in their industry beforehand.
- Describe them, think big & wide, and give solutions.

From my share of experiences, here are 5 reasons why introversion is no less than a powerful asset:

1 Delaying gratification:

Sharing your goals too early gives a fake sense of achievement. This makes you feel like you've achieved something big. When you avoid sharing, your focus will increase, and you'll see yourself actually doing the work.

# 2 Process-based praise:

Introversion helps you focus on the process instead of the results. This helps you to work more efficiently.

# 3 Blocking out early negative feedback:

When you work on the ideas before asking for feedback, you can focus on what you are building. This helps to avoid negative comments that could slow you down.

# 4 Embracing deep work:

Building a business needs a lot of solo focus. When you cut yourself from every distraction, you can invest more time in deep thinking and solving problems by yourself.


# <u>5</u>Perceptive listening:
