Using Heather McGhee’s “drained pool” framework from <i>The Sum of Us</i>, we will explore how racism weakens collective power and how cross-racial solidarity strengthens unions and the labor movement as a whole. Grounded in the Memphis Sanitation Workers’ Strike—an iconic example of workers fighting for dignity and justice—we will analyze how racism shows up in organizational practices, whose participation is supported or limited, and how union values can be reclaimed to “refill the pool” for all members.</p> <p>Through discussion of Fletcher and Hurd’s analysis of race, gender, and union culture, the Anti-Racist Organizational Continuum, and the documentary <i>The River I Stand</i>, participants will identify barriers within their own unions and develop concrete equity-focused goals for their Leadership in Action plans.
