Title

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Word count: 10-15 pages A4 (5000 words, excluding abstract, acknowledgments, tables, figure legends, and references)

Number of tables: specify the number of tables in the article.

Number of figures: indicate the number of figures in the article.

Abbreviations. All abbreviations used in the text of the article should be provided with their decoding.

¹ Department, institution/institute/university/clinic/hospital, city, country

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Abstract

Abstract should not exceed 300 words.

Abstract should be unstructured.

Information in abstracts must not differ from that in the text. Authors should ensure that information is consistent in both places and that they accurately reflect the content of the article.

The summary should accurately reflect the content of the article with a brief outline and main points of the article.

It should be written clearly and concisely in a free form (without a specific structure).

Keywords

3-8 keywords or short phrases that reflect the main issues raised in the article according to MeSH (Medical Subject Headings).

The text of the article should be structured as follows:

- Introduction,
- The main part
- Discussion

Introduction

- Identify the topic and scope of the related literature to be reviewed;
- State the importance of the review i.e., the point of view;
- state the scope of the review what is included and what is not. Intentional exclusions should also be noted;
- Explain how the review is organised, i.e. its sequence

The main part

- The review should be organised according to one of the following principles: chronological, thematic or methodological;
- each work should be critically summarised and evaluated in terms of background, methodology and conclusions;
- it is as important to consider inconsistencies, omissions and errors as it is to identify accuracy, depth and relevance;

Conclusion.

- summarise the important aspects of the existing body of literature;
- assess the current state and accessibility of the literature reviewed;
- identify significant shortcomings or gaps in existing knowledge;
- identify areas for future research;
- link your research to existing knowledge.

References

Citations in the text, tables, and legends must be given by Arabic numerals in [square brackets] and numbered according to the reference list.

References should be numbered consecutively in the order in which they are first mentioned in the text.

The titles of journals should be abbreviated according to the style used for MEDLINE (www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/nlmcatalog/journals).

As recommended by ICMJE, references should follow the standards summarized in the NLM's Sample References

(https://www.nlm.nih.gov/bsd/uniform_requirements.html) webpage and detailed in the NLM's Citing Medicine, 2nd edition (https://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/books/NBK7256/).

Provide the links to articles on the title's website or article's DOI

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The headings of the graphs should correspond exactly to their content.

All figures should be carefully verified, correspond to the figures in the text and must be statistically processed.

All explanations and interpretations of abbreviations should be placed in notes (footnotes), but not in the table title.

It should be noted which statistical indicators were used to represent the variability of the data, such as standard deviation (SD) or error of the mean (m).

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In the manuscript, legends for illustrations should be on a separate page, with Arabic numerals corresponding to the illustrations.

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
