- 1) Must have at least 2 years' experience as a chef because the person will be in charge of the kitchen.
- 2) Must speak fluent English and Russian.
- 3) Must have recognized training in preparing Russian food from a reputable cooking academy.
- 4) Must be looking for a long-term position.
- 5) Must be able to work in the UK.
