# What are HTML headings?

- Headings are HTML tags that hold titles and subheadings on a web page
- They start at h1 which holds the overall title of the entire page and go down to h6 in order of importance, with h6 being least important

### Why do they matter?

- They give order and structure to the web page page
- They allow the browser to index and structure your page visually
- They allow users and screen readers to skip to sections in order to find what they need faster

## What should be included in headings?

- Descriptive titles that accurately describes what is on the page
- Descriptive subheadings that describe the subject of the paragraph under the subheading
  - This allows users to find what they need quickly (WCAG 2.4.6)

# What should we avoid when using headings?

- Using more than one H1
  - Only one H1 should be on a page
  - The H1 holds the overall topic of the page
- Choosing headings for style
  - Headings should be used based on topic order, not for style
  - To style your headings, use CSS to manipulate the size, font and weight of your letters
- Placing headings in non-sequential order
  - For example, after H1 comes H2, then H3 (as a subtitle of H2) then H4 (as a subtitle of H3)
  - Order can be nonsequential if starting a new section after a subsection (for example a h2 after a h3 subsection to start a new section)
