<u>Lactation Consultants</u>- is an individual who is a health professional specializing in the clinical management of breastfeeding. If you are having lactation situations arise that you are having trouble solving, consider reaching out to one of these sources.

Cuddles and Cream lactation services are located in Yakima, WA. Her name is Sherilyn Johnson, and her services are a paid service including a wide range of care. She offers complete lactation support services from the beginning of your journey to the end, parent and baby groups and classes, offers breastfeeding/chestfeeding supplies, and phototherapy. Her approach is more scientific, including weighted feeds and testing the fat content of your milk. She is a very kind source and knowledgeable. Nurturing Naturally lactation services are located in Ellensburg, WA. The woman who leads it is named Gloria Wright, and she has helped women locally for 40 years. She is a free resource who will come to your home if you are located in Ellensburg, or you are more than welcome to come to her home from anywhere. She hosts mother and baby meetings every second Tuesday of each month. She does prefer partners don't come to these meetings because some of the guests aren't comfortable sharing as openly. If you want your partner to come, they are welcomed in individual sessions. She focuses on the nurturing aspect of breastfeeding/chestfeeding and how our bodies are designed to give our babies what they need in most cases. If you birth at **Memorial Hospital** in Yakima, then the lactation consultant services are included while you are there. If your in Yakima and birth somewhere else or are less than two weeks postpartum when you need help, there is a paid service at **Healthy Beginnings Clinic** in Memorial Hospital. They do accept insurance, but only some will cover these services. They evaluate issues in feeding the newborn, assess jaundice, and measures weight loss in the first two

weeks. They can make same-day appointments if you call and schedule before 10 am. Call (509)-575-8233 for scheduling an appointment and call (509)-574-5883 to speak with a lactation consultant.

KVH hospital in Ellensburg offers free lactation consultation services to anyone. The woman you want to get in contact with is named Rosika. Their goal is for everyone to have the information and support to feel confident feeding their new baby. To schedule a prenatal consultation, contact Lactation Services at (509)-962-7388.
