List of ideas to discuss in our first Google+ Hangout (and refine as we go along)

- A. Four principles suggested in [9] characterize sustainable virtual communities:
- 1) Clear purpose or vision State a clear goal for this group. 3 sentences or less.
- 2) Clear definition of members' roles (such as designing community activities based on community membership life cycle: visitor, novice, regular, leader) Do we want specialized roles?
- 3) Leadership by community moderators Is leadership by one person working well (we have to ask Jessy:)? How about 2 leaders? Or no leaders (self-organizing)?
- 4) Online/offline events—important since they strengthen members' identification within the community and with one another How often should we have an online meeting? Once a week? Once a month? Whenever someone suggests it?
- B. Koh et al (2007) propose four stimulation drivers:
- 1) Leader involvement See 3 above
- 2) Offline or synchronous online interaction See 4 above.
- 3) Usefulness How can we choose articles in a better way?
- 4) IT infrastructure quality What properties of P2PU a) support and b) limit participation and discussion? (I would really like to have better threading!!)
- C. Two main findings from their survey: Authors also found that posting activity is influenced by offline interaction (p < 0.01) and that viewing activity (i.e. lurkers :) is affected by perceived usefulness (p < 0.01). For me (Jennifer), it seems our 2 biggest goals should be 1) identifying useful content (articles) 2) weekly discussion of content in a Hangout (or whatever synchronous meeting place) and in our P2PU forum (and in our own blogs? ...when our thoughts are worth sharing)
- D. Who wants to choose the next paper? Jos says he has one to suggest. Stian could maybe suggest a paper sometime on self-directed learning, and/or something from the Knowledge Media and Design course, or even something you've put together on open access, open scholar, whatever you are interested in.
- E. What are our interests, exactly? Maybe we should collect them so we know who is interested in what. We could even use a spreadsheet.
- F. Philipp and Jessy's idea of collaborative papers.

I wonder if collaboratively writing a summary of the paper, that highlights the most interesting points, biggest doubts and questions, and comes up with concrete applications to P2PU would not be a useful task for everyone in the group. It would also be an immensely useful resource for others in the field (and could establish P2PU and the homestead as a destination for research on peer learning).
