RESEARCH INTERESTS, EXPERTISE, and CURRENT PROJECTS

Topical – discard, materiality, household archaeology, Indigenous North America, political economy, technology, archaeological method, experimental archaeology

Regional – North America, w/emphases in the Pacific Northwest, British Columbia, California, southern New England, and Pennsylvania

I am an archaeological anthropologist with research programs that address 1) materiality and discard behavior in contemporary North America and 2) the organization of Stó:lō-Coast Salish households amid settler-colonialism in western British Columbia. The latter project is a long-term research collaboration with Chawathil First Nation and the Stó:lō Research and Resources Management Centre. Some common threads in these seemingly disparate research domains include a focus on discard(ing) as a culturally generative domain of human behavior, household materiality, quotidian life, and the methodical scrutiny of less-glamorous, less-studied, and oft-dismissed realms of the material record. Training undergraduates in research design, implementation, and dissemination are key features of my research projects.

Archaeological Interventions in Contemporary Discard (2013–present). This area of my research program explores and advocates for the application of archaeological concept, method and theory to the study of present-day discard phenomena. Past and current projects are tied to methods-intensive and experientially immersive curricula designed to apprentice undergraduates in research design, reciprocal collaborations, and methodologically rigorous fieldwork in local communities: 1) a study of social performance and signification in discarded cigarettes and surface ephemera at urban drinking establishments, 2) ideologies of dissent, involuntary dispossession, and the emotive capacities of assemblages of illegally dumped possessions, and 3) memory, materiality, and reconstitution in massive purges of American household belongings.

Welqámex Household Archaeological Research Project (2003–present). This project—a direct collaboration with Chawathil First Nations and the Stó:lō Research and Resource Management Centre—explores changes in the organization of Stó:lō-Coast Salish society over the last 600 years and through the lens of methodologically rigorous, household-level archaeological investigations at *Welqámex*, a strategically located island settlement that played a shaping role in Colonial era inter-community interactions on the lower Fraser River in southwestern British Columbia. Nearing the project’s conclusion, current efforts are focused on 1) analyzing and synthesizing six seasons of excavation data, and 2) the experimental archaeological study of a fishing-focused political economy.

College Archaeologist. As College Archaeologist at Connecticut College, I serve as a steward of archaeological and heritage resources across 750 acres of the ancestral territories of the Western Nehântick, Mohegan, Eastern Pequot, and Mashantucket Pequot communities. This role occupies a distinctive intersection of service, research, and teaching, entailing archaeological consultation for campus construction projects, policy development for heritage stewardship, and oversight of field investigations—all while affording students direct, hands-on training in applied archaeological methods. Through collaborations with Tribal Historic Preservation Offices, State offices, and the implementation of field- and lab-based research, I draw on the same methodological commitments and ethical dispositions that characterize my collaborative work in the Pacific Northwest. This integrative approach helps shape institutional policy, contribute to archaeological scholarship, and build inclusive learning opportunities.
