Overview:

Holding onto the Rope of God is a newly introduced specialized course that addresses your needs growing up in Western societies in your late teens. This course will equip you with the foundational knowledge necessary to attend the GCIL Advanced level, Levels 7 through 9. However, this specialized course not only summarizes Level 1 through Level 6 of GCIL Sunday School but will also cover relevant topics in general that will help you navigate the challenges you may face with your beliefs and identities.

We at GCIL understand the importance of creating a space where young students like yourself can comfortably explore and discuss various aspects of your religion. Like all our courses, this course aims to cultivate critical thinking and teach you how to cherish it to become comfortable with your Muslim identity in the Western context. You will engage in lively and thought-provoking discussions on various topics ranging from the core tenets of Islam to contemporary issues relevant to teenagers.

Objectives:

At the end of this course, you will be able to:

- Develop a good understanding of religion and the need for religion in the 21st century
- Concept of faith in Islam and understanding fundamental Islamic beliefs
- Understand the concepts like God, Messengers, worship rituals, the pillars, and the wisdom behind these rituals and perform these religious rituals correctly, e.g., ablution and prayer

- Understand the main target of religion, which is upholding high moral standards. This will introduce the concept of morality in Islam and how to develop the human character that the Quran wants from us
- Understanding the concepts of reward, punishment, hellfire, and heaven, directly related to moral behavior and how to navigate the challenges in Western societies
- In the end, learn the tools that will help you build a lifelong relationship with the Last Book of God on earth, the Quran.
- Appreciate why the Quran is a unique book and how it should be approached when understanding
- Know the principles of understanding the Quran
- Apply the knowledge gained about the sciences of the Quran to the selected passages of the Quran
