

Best DSLR Cameras for Beginner Photographers

Are you a beginner who just graduated from taking pictures with your smartphone? Congratulations! Now that you are getting serious with photography, you'll need a versatile Digital Single-Lens Reflex (DSLR) camera to learn how to use manual aperture and shutter speed like a pro.

The best DSLR cameras for beginners put advanced capabilities - like interchangeable lenses, sensible handling, high-quality sensors, and optical viewfinders that allow photographers to express their true craft - into your hands for a reasonable price.

So, whether you are looking to get into vlogging, wildlife photography, or artistic photography, make sure you read the following list to see which top entry-level DSLR camera is best for you.

Nikon D3500

The D3500 picks up where the already excellent D3400 left off but comes with increased battery life and an ergonomic grip that is very comfortable to hold. While not the flashiest DSLR camera out there, the Nikon D3500 camera's compact design, image quality, and, above all, sensible price has made it one of the top DSLR cameras for beginners.

If the pricing is a major concern, you'll find the D3500 \$500 price-point more than reasonable. Not only does the camera have an uncommonly long battery life, allowing you to shoot up to 1,550 photos between charges, but its 24MP sensor, the same one used on the D5600, can deliver images of exceptional quality and is considered one of the best APS-C on the market today.

Although the pricing means that the D3500 does away with some advanced features, its newbie-friendly shooting mode and 5 frames per second (fps) burst rate make it a well-rounded camera for most types of photography - especially when combined with a Nikon AF-P DX 18-55mm f/3.5-5.6G VR lens kit.

Canon EOS Rebel SL3 / EOS 250D / EOS 200D Mark II

Weighing only 447 grams, the EOS Rebel SL3 proves that good things come in small packages. Despite its small size, the SL3's powerful processing engine, DIGIC 8 image processor, 4K HD video capability, and substantial battery life (1,070 photos per charge) make it the perfect sidekick for the amateur guerrilla photographer.

Whether you are stalking birds through a green forest or crisscrossing the urban jungle, the Rebel SL3's 3-inch articulated touchscreen, electronic image stabilizer, eye-detector, and 9-point autofocus system means capturing perfect shots is as easy as aiming and pulling a trigger.

Furthermore, once you are comfortable enough to take the training wheels off, you can use its excellent optical viewfinder to learn how to truly set a beautiful shot on your own. Just make sure you refer to Canon's excellent reference guides - including the Shooting Mode Guide and Creative Assist - to solve any question you may have about setting your shots.

Nikon D5600

If you don't mind paying extra to get a little more power, then the Nikon D5600 represents a step in the right direction. With its large LCD screen, low weight (just 465 grams), high-quality sensor, well-matched native lenses, and arguably the best autofocus system on the market, the D5600 is especially well-suited to action-packed photography.

While it's its autofocus system that draws the most attention, the D5600 is a complete package that includes a fully-articulating LCD touchscreen, wireless capability, good battery life for its class (970 photos), and comprehensive controls which beginners find easy to master.

The camera's main drawback, though, is its price - which stands around \$600. However, while its price might set it outside the absolute beginner's budget, the D5600's unrivaled autofocus, excellent sensor, and friendly touch interface make it an awesome long-term investment for beginners looking to get serious about photography.

Canon EOS Rebel T100 / EOS 4000D / EOS 3000D

For those who prefer to tip their toes in the water before going in, the Rebel T100 allows them to take professional-quality images for a very affordable price. The Rebel T100 only costs \$299 on Amazon, yet comes with the same smart full auto shooting mode and guide found on more high-end Canon cameras.

The quality is understandably modest compared to other models - for example, its 18MP image sensor and DIGIC 4+ feel dated when compared with more high-end models. However, even the T100's simple 9-point autofocus, 1080p full HD video up to 30 fps, and basic Auto mode can feel like a massive improvement for a beginner - especially if your only experience with photography comes from your smartphone.

So, don't hesitate to give the T100 a try if you're not sure about sticking to photography or don't mind upgrading to a better camera once you have gained enough experience.

Canon EOS Rebel T7i / EOS 800D

With its 24.2MP sensor, 45 autofocus points, and superb electronic image stabilization, the Rebel T7i is an eclectic DSLR camera that can do anything from landscape photography to recording high-paced sports events. Part of its attractiveness comes from its 3.0 fully-articulating touchscreen that allows users to access the Feature Assistance interface and get a detailed breakdown of the camera's modes in a simple and easy-to-understand way.

Although the T7i is considerably pricier than other DSLR beginner cameras noted here - currently standing at \$799 on Amazon - its image specifications and comfortable controls make it a pleasure to use on any location.

Pentax K-70

Rugged and battle-proven, the Pentax K-70 is an impressive design that every outdoor enthusiast will love. From its tough articulating screen to its hybrid live view autofocus, every feature of the K-70 is built to withstand inclement weather and rough handling.

But it's not like Pentax neglected image quality and focused single-mindedly on survivability, though, as the K-70's 24.2MP sensor, 1080p full HD video up to 60 fps, 6 fps burst shooting, and impressive lens lineup can give even the best Canon and Nikon cameras a run for their money.

Furthermore, the camera's 11-point hybrid autofocus, which uses a mix of contrast and phase-detection systems to improve accuracy, and in-body-image stabilization allows users to shoot sharper images at slower shutter speeds.

In the end, the best DSLR camera for beginners will be the one that best suits your needs. So, whether you are looking for an entry-level DSLR camera to do outdoors, fashion, or fashion photography, this list will give you a good starting point.
