Description:

This program will look at two important psychoanalytic concepts. We will first explore a key element of Winnicott's conception of '*subject destroys object*' – how it is that a real external object (a real person, and not the internal object) is destroyed in the *developmental process* of moving from object-relating to object-usage.

Secondly, we will explore Winnicott's notion of how this destructive activity is the patient's attempt to place the therapist outside the area of omnipotent control, that is, *out in the world*. Ogden states the therapist then becomes 'the actual living, breathing, emotionally responsive external object' that is (inevitably, inescapably) 'becoming destroyed' in the developmental process leading to the patient's achievement of object-usage.

Finally, we will address how the essential therapeutic task is for the therapist to 'survive being destroyed' – exploring what it takes to survive '*because of being real*' - because we are able to do psychological work with our feelings of being destroyed and surviving destruction.

"Good Will Hunting" illustrates the uniquely complicated ways that individuals become more real and more connected to another through surviving experiences of being destroyed - as emotional ties between various characters are being established, destroyed, and potentially re-established throughout the film. We will discuss in small group selected key exchanges in the film, and relate them to our own case experiences, and life experiences as well.

Program Objectives:

At the end of the program, participants will be able to:

1. Describe the difference between object relating and object usage.
2. Explain Winnicott's notion of '*becoming real because destroyed, becoming destroyed because real*'.
3. Describe how the analyst's survival of 'maximum destructiveness' creates '*externality*' for the patient.
