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Dear Church Family and Friends,

Recent news about the dangers of being caught in a riptide got me thinking about parallels between that natural phenomenon (a strong narrow offshore current which pulls water through an inlet steadily out to sea) and a tendency toward busyness, a phenomenon that can make life seem full and us seem important.

Do you know what's really important and what you value most? I now do. After sifting through over eighty given choices, my top three most important values are: Purpose-to have meaning and direction in my life, Loved- to be loved by those close to me, and Spirituality-to grow and mature spiritually (which for me, includes doing God's will.)

When caught in a riptide, it is futile to try and swim against the force. (It's able to pull your body at a speed of 1-2 feet per second and up to 8 ft per second which is faster than any Olympic swimmer.) What happens almost immediately is panic: the first step toward drowning.

Panic is also the first step toward becoming overwhelmed by bad news. It's the thing that leads to muddled thinking and becoming incapacitated. Instead of acting instinctively or panicking, professionals advise that swimmers turn on their back and float. *Stop trying to fight the current. Stop trying to make progress. Relax and take nice, slow, deep breaths before succumbing to fear.*

I can personally relate to this advice after having a frightening experience while snorkeling miles offshore in FLA. Since putting it on, I felt constrained by my wet suit. In fact, it felt too tight all over, unnatural, even suffocating to my entire body. After disembarking from the boat, time and time again, saltwater kept flooding my face mask, entering my nose/mouth/snorkel every time I tried taking a breath. Plus, without my glasses I can't see past an arm's length.

No matter how I adjusted things, tightened, or loosened straps, the mask and snorkel continued to leak. I began to panic. One of the safety guides came over and instructed me to lie flat on my back and tilt my chin upward. She proceeded to tow me to the boat where I immediately stripped down to my bathing suit and processed what occurred.

"I have always been such a strong swimmer. I love the water. No one was more excited about snorkeling than I. What happened???"

By trying to conform to the expectations of others, by acting like I was competent, by attempting to follow instructions without asking questions, I set myself up for trouble.

In general, I know this about myself: *"When things don't go as expected and in rapid succession I fail despite repeated concerted efforts, I will start to panic."*

What I was reminded of that day still serves me well. In unfamiliar situations, I need time to assess

things and determine what may cause a problem. Also, as a rule, anything moderately to majorly constraining doesn't suit me, lol.

After a few moments in the boat, I plunged in again to join the others wearing my swimsuit and different mask. I never felt the cold (which was the reason for donning a wetsuit to start with). I ditched the snorkel and happily swam about admiring all the fish. Another thing that's true: I hate to miss out or fail to see and do what others are able to see and do. ;)

Being a Christian often entails learning to swim diagonally and parallel to the shore rather than fighting forces directly or aiming for the shortest distance ashore. Prayer is akin to floating on one's back, taking time to relax and breathe. It's an exercise in surrender that helps us realize what's important and to prioritize our resources. It helps us make better decisions and stay true to what we believe.

What forces are at work in you or around you today? Are you striving for something important or working to oppose an undercurrent? Do you feel constricted or constrained? How? Why? What might you need to shed in order to enjoy what life has to offer?

Don't let fear make you over function, stay too busy, cause panic or carry you toward drowning. Float, breathe, tilt back your chin.

I found needing the help of a safety guide embarrassing and somewhat disconcerting that day, but by allowing her to tow me safely to the boat, I was better able to assess things and make decisions from there. This is also true of whenever God intervenes on our behalf.

The end result becomes much better than it would have been once we willingly surrender, even momentarily, once we stop trying to make adjustments while also treading water, once we stop trying to deal with repeated failures/leaks, and once we realize that what we're really feeling is like we can't catch a break or a breath.

And remember: God considers our safety and enjoyment to be paramount ingredients of life's great excursion. So, don't fight against every strong force directly. Look further ahead at a diagonal trajectory. Keep a side eye on the shoreline and aim to arrive eventually, not necessarily quickly.

IDENTIFYING & TREATING LYME DISEASE

Lyme disease, a complex and often mis-diagnosed illness, affects approximately 476,000 people annually in the United States. Found in all 50 states and every continent but Antarctica, it is transmitted primarily by the Ixodes tick, more commonly known as the deer tick or black-legged tick. If not promptly addressed, the ailment can lead to long-term health complications. Thanks to advancements in medicine, the identification and treatment of Lyme disease continues to evolve and improve.

Historical Context

The story of Lyme disease began in the 1970s with a community outbreak of facial palsy and arthritis in Lyme, Connecticut. An explanation for this mysterious illness did not surface until the early 1980s, when Willy Burgdorfer, an investigator for the National Institutes of Health, discovered a bacterium in ticks from the area (*Borrelia Burgdorferi*), laying the foundation for modern testing and diagnostic methods.

Diagnosing a Complex Disease

There are several complicating factors that make a Lyme disease diagnosis difficult. The characteristic bullseye-shaped rash is present in less than half of cases and may disappear quickly. Early signs and symptoms such as fever, chills, muscle pain, headache, joint pain, fatigue and swollen lymph nodes are easily mistaken for other illnesses. The utility of early lab testing is limited because the process takes several weeks and can lead to false negatives. This leaves physicians to rely on observable symptoms and rule out other possible causes. A doctor will also ask if a patient has been out in the woods or grassy areas where they might have been exposed to black-legged ticks. Tom Moorcroft, DO, the

founder of Origins of Health and an investigator of medical mysteries, refers to Lyme disease as “the new great imitator and instigator,” describing its ability to mimic various other diseases, often at the same time. For people experiencing persistent symptoms, comprehensive lab testing may be needed to distinguish between Lyme and other tick-borne and non-tick-borne diseases.

Treatment Options

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), untreated Lyme disease can produce a wide range of symptoms, including fever, rash, facial paralysis and arthritis. While conventional antibiotics remain a cornerstone for early-stage treatment, emerging research increasingly recognizes and supports the role of natural and botanical medicine. In a 2020 study published in *Frontiers in Medicine*, seven botanical agents were identified as promising treatments for Lyme disease, including black walnut, Japanese knotweed, sweet wormwood, cat's claw and Chinese skullcap. *Cryptolepis sanguinolenta* extract caused a complete eradication of the *B. Burgdorferi* bacterium in their study. The scientists recommended additional research to determine dosages and extract combinations that might offer hope for those suffering long-term symptoms. The integrative and functional medicine approach to treating Lyme disease is multifaceted and customized, taking into account an individual's health history, environmental factors and unique physiological responses. The overarching goals are to target the infection, bolster the immune system, manage symptoms and promote overall well-being. According to Dr. Darin Ingels, a licensed doctor of naturopathic medicine and author of *The Lyme Solution*, “All other therapies, no matter what they are, probably aren't going to be as effective until you've really taken care of your gut health and your mental and emotional being.”

Lifestyle interventions are critical in this holistic treatment. A diet rich in whole foods, clean proteins and minimal grains, dairy, sugar and processed foods can mitigate

inflammation and aid recovery. Complementary practices such as regular exercise, sauna sessions, Epsom salt baths, sufficient sleep and stress management techniques play vital roles in healing and preventing long-term complications.

Prevention Tips

Prevention is integral in combating Lyme disease. Tick repellents and protective clothing can significantly reduce bites. After spending time in wooded or grassy areas, thoroughly check the skin for early tick detection and removal. Upon discovering a tick, remove it promptly and monitor the bite area for signs of a rash or infection. If symptoms appear, quickly seek guidance from a healthcare professional with expertise in Lyme disease. A healthy diet, regular exercise and sufficient sleep are essential for maintaining a robust immune system and can bolster the body's defenses, potentially reducing the risk of developing chronic Lyme disease.


