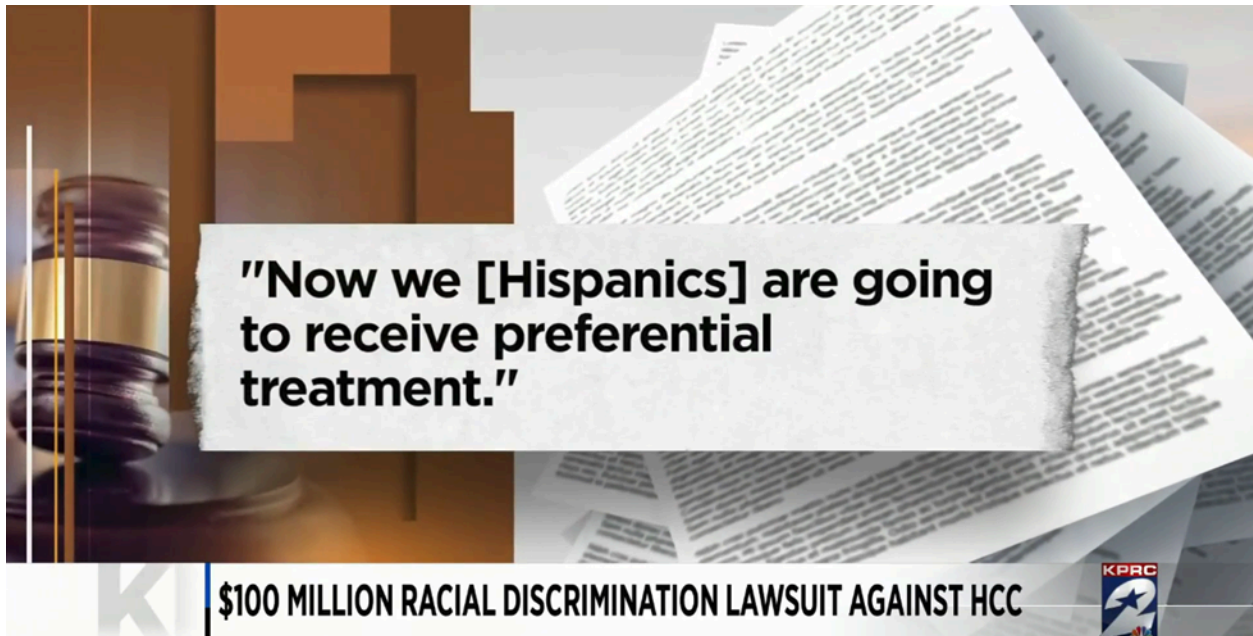

Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Title VII): Prohibits employment discrimination (hiring, firing, promotions).

Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Title VI): Prohibits discrimination in programs receiving federal financial assistance.

Fair Housing Act (Civil Rights Act of 1968): Bans discrimination in the sale, rental, and financing of housing.

Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide

Article I

The Contracting Parties confirm that genocide, whether committed in time of peace or in time of war, is a crime under international law which they undertake to prevent and to punish.

Article II

In the present Convention, genocide means any of the following acts committed with intent to destroy, in whole or in part, a national, ethnical, racial or religious group, as such: (a) Killing members of the group; (b) Causing serious bodily or mental harm to members of the group; (c) Deliberately inflicting on the group conditions of life calculated to bring about its physical destruction in whole or in

part; (d) Imposing measures intended to prevent births within the group; (e) Forcibly transferring children of the group to another group.

Article III

The following acts shall be punishable: (a) Genocide; (b) Conspiracy to commit genocide; (c) Direct and public incitement to commit genocide; (d) Attempt to commit genocide; (e) Complicity in genocide.

Article IV

Persons committing genocide or any of the other acts enumerated in article III shall be punished, whether they are constitutionally responsible rulers, public officials or private individuals. Article V

The Contracting Parties undertake to enact, in accordance with their respective Constitutions, the necessary legislation to give effect to the provisions of the present Convention, and, in particular, to provide effective penalties for persons guilty of genocide or any of the other acts enumerated in article III.

Article VI

Persons charged with genocide or any of the other acts enumerated in article III shall be tried by a competent tribunal of the State in the territory of which the act was committed, or by such international penal tribunal as may have jurisdiction with respect to those Contracting Parties which shall have accepted its jurisdiction.

Race vs. ethnicity vs. nationality

That's the common classification; some people may use slight variations.

Now, with that out of the way, let's take a look at Africa as an example. Africa, a continent, is made up of 54 countries, nearly all, if not all, containing different ethnic groups with different tribes. The Black native ethnic groups of South Africa are not the same as the native ethnic groups of Ethiopia. Nor are the native ethnic groups of Nigeria the same as those in Uganda. And they all have vastly different languages, cultures and history. But they all get labeled as *Africans*, which might give you the impression that they are one identical group. The same is true for Europe and Europeans. For example, the native ethnic groups of Romania are not the same as those of Ireland.

Black American descendants of slaves (or slavery)

Neighboring tribes who had always been in Africa along with descendants of outsiders (the secret ingredient) who came into Africa were taken from the areas of West and Central Africa, mostly; and shipped to the Americas where they ended up in North America. In North America, small percentages of White/European and Native North American/Indian DNA was added to the group. These Blacks all mixed with one another, and this is how we became a separate, created, group. And this group was almost entirely located in the South.

(As you can see, it was basically only Whites and us, not all of these other people.)

This four million (actually more, but there were issues with the count) continued to mix with one another and grow. Today, we are one group. We have our own culture, our own everything. And oh my goodness, we definitely have a shared experience/history as a group (put in the heat and bonded together). And it's been like this for hundreds of years. So, we are our own ethnic group. We actually have the same ethnicity, race, nationality and culture. But what about Latinos?

What is a Latino?

The current countries in the land masses now called North and South America have pretty much the same history: There were native tribes; and then European invaders arrived, and in some areas, totally replaced the natives. The Europeans then brought in Africans. Later, a handful of immigrants migrated to these lands. At some point in all of this a label was given to their territory. This is considered their nation – and it is from this that we get “nationality”.

“Members of the Latino community ran the gamut of virtually every racial and ethnic group found in the world. The initial voyages of exploration and discovery

of the Western Hemisphere by Europeans from Spain, England, Portugal, France, and the Netherlands quickly led to a racial amalgamation of these primarily White people with the bronze-skinned Indigenous peoples. This mixture of races resulted in what came to be referred to in Spanish America as mestizos. This group would become the predominant racial entity throughout much of Central and South America, as well as what is the present day US Southwest. When the European settlers in Mexico, Central America, and South America found they could not successfully exploit the Indigenous peoples in mining and agriculture, they turned to the importation of Africans. They initially used Africans as indentured servants but ultimately used them as enslaved people. England, France, Portugal, Spain, and the Netherlands entered into an extensive and lucrative transshipment of Africans to the Western Hemisphere, where they were sold as labor for the mining of precious metals and the manufacture of sugar, cotton, rice, and a wide variety of other marketable crops. Enslavers bred their human chattels with other enslaved persons as part of the existing economic system, and soon Black people—later typed as mulattoes, quadroons, octoroons, and other racial mixtures—became part of a gene pool already containing a mixture of White and American Indian strains. In the course of the centuries that followed, Asians joined the heterogeneous racial population that spread throughout the Western Hemisphere. Chinese people settled in substantial numbers along the borders of Mexico's northernmost states. Faced with persecution by warring factions during Mexico's Revolution of 1910, they migrated to the United States in large numbers.”

“The AP Stylebook also distinguishes between the terms Hispanic and Latino. The Stylebook limits the term Hispanic to people ‘from – or whose ancestors were from – a Spanish-speaking land or culture’. It provides a more expansive definition, however, of the term Latino. The Stylebook definition of Latino includes not only people of Spanish-speaking ancestry, but also more generally includes persons ‘from – or whose ancestors were from – . . . Latin America’. The Stylebook specifically lists ‘Brazilian’ as an example of a group which can be considered Latino. There were 28 categories tabulated in the 2000 United States census:

Comparing Latinos To Black Americans

Minus immigrants and children of immigrants, there are about 30 million Black American descendants of slaves in the U.S.

Comparing Black American descendants of slaves to Latinos

There are about 68 million Latinos in the U.S. But comparing Black American descendants of slaves to Latinos is like comparing one ethnic group within a

country/continent to members of an entire continent of ethnic groups that have entered that same country/continent.

Comparing Black American descendants of slaves to Mexicans

There are about 38 million Mexicans in the U.S. This includes immigrants and those who have ancestry that traces back to Mexico. But, this is not an ethnic group; it's a nationality. It's a mixture of a bunch of different ethnic groups that lived in Mexico before coming to the U.S. Mexico is a country with a population of about 132 million people of various ethnic groups. 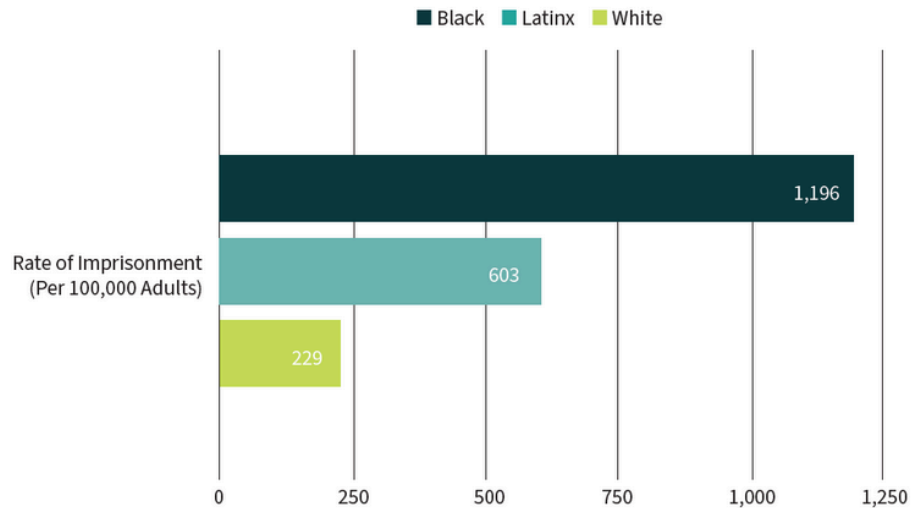

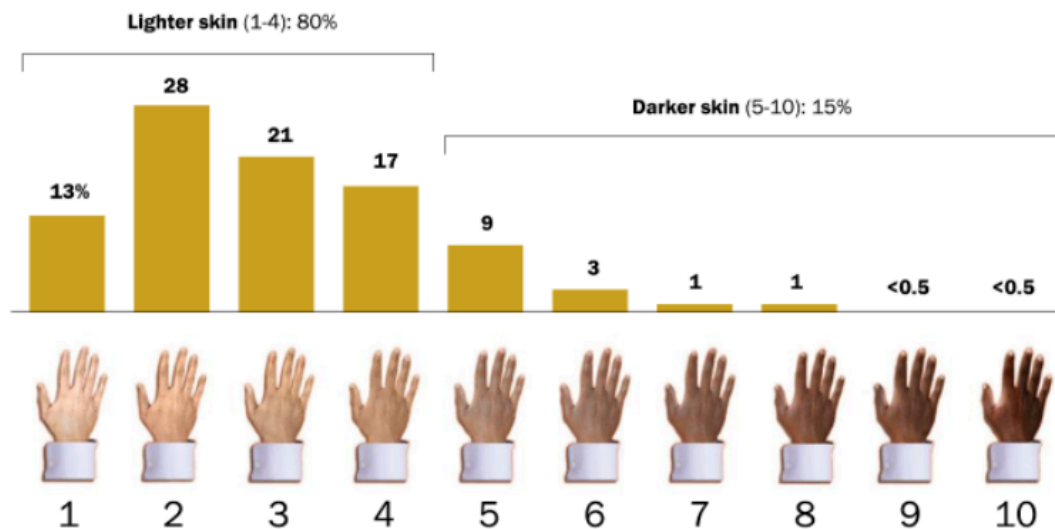
Are they making the Latino and Black American statistics close on purpose to give the illusion of shared discrimination? Whatever the case, it's clear that they can literally create illusions at will.

What Is A Mexican?

Mexicans: People who are from Mexico. This is a nationality, like being an American, so it could actually be referring to indigenous Mexicans, people of European descent, mixed race individuals, and any other group of people who are from Mexico. When most Americans used to think of Mexicans the more indigenous-looking, brown-skinned Mexicans came to mind. Now, it's the lighter skinned Mexicans that come to mind.

During the initial period of colonization of the Americas by the Spanish, there were three chief categories of ethnicities: Spaniard (*español*), American Indian (*indio*), and African (*negro*). Throughout the territories of the Spanish Empire in the Americas, ways of differentiating individuals in a racial hierarchy, often called in the modern era the *sistema de castas* or the *sociedad de castas*, developed where society was divided based on color, *calidad* (status), and other factors.

The main divisions were as follows:

1. *Español* (fem. *española*), i.e. Spaniard – person of Spanish ancestry; a blanket term, subdivided into *Peninsulares* and *Criollos*
 - *Peninsular* – a person of Spanish descent born in Spain who later settled in the Americas;

- *Criollo* (fem. *criolla*) – a person of Spanish descent born in the Americas;
- 2. *Castizo* (fem. *castiza*) – a person with primarily Spanish and some American Indian ancestry born into a mixed family.
- 3. *Mestizo* (fem. *mestiza*) – a person of extended mixed Spanish and American Indian ancestry;
- 4. *Indio* (fem. *India*) – a person of pure American Indian ancestry;
- 5. *Pardo* (fem. *parda*) – a person of mixed Spanish, Amerindian and African ancestry; sometimes a polite term for a black person;
- 6. *Mulato* (fem. *mulata*) – a person of mixed Spanish and African ancestry;
- 7. *Zambo* – a person of mixed African and American Indian ancestry;
- 8. *Negro* (fem. *negra*) – a person of African descent, primarily former enslaved Africans and their descendants.

“Officially, racial classifications were officially discouraged in so-called Latin America after Spain lost control over most of its colonies there in the early 1800s. Just the same, many governments, like Mexico’s, promoted a mestizo national identity based on a mix of European and indigenous heritages. In the United States and Canada, we call this process assimilation. In Mexico, by contrast, it is called mestizaje. Mestizaje policies ask Indigenous Peoples to join the national community and economy, adopt the Spanish language, and abandon their traditional tribal communities, culture, language and dress. Various Jewish communities in Mexico have their own publications, including newspapers and magazines reflecting the ideologies of different groups. Examples include Imagen David, Identidad Monte Sinai, and NotiKehile.

Representation in Media:

While some Jewish characters or storylines are explicitly presented in Mexican media, there are also instances where Jewish identity is implied or understood by those familiar with the community. For example, in the Mexican remake of *Rebelde*, the character Niko had to hide his Jewishness.

"This article surveys the contributions to the political foundations of Mexico by the general and president Vicente Guerrero, 1781-1831. Guerrero was of African, Indian, and Spanish heritage, and he was raised in a colonial setting in which anyone African in Mexico was subjected by the Spaniards to special legal disadvantages, including the stipulation that only Africans could be made slaves. Guerrero's life shows a consistent struggle to achieve equal rights for Afro-Mexicans, and also for those on the Indigenous side of his family. Guerrero is

called ‘the consummator of independence’ for his role as commander in chief of the Mexican army during the last years of the 1810–1821 war with Spain; and he is called the Mexican ‘Abraham Lincoln’ for issuing his country’s presidential slavery abolition proclamation. He is also credited with creating a grass roots-oriented political tradition. A century after Guerrero’s 1810 struggle for independence, there came the 1910 Mexican social revolution associated with Emiliano Zapata, for which Guerrero was the posthumous leader emeritus; according to historian Rafael Ramos Pedrueza, who declares in his book, *Vicente Guerrero: Precursor del Socialismo*, that Guerrero was ‘the brother of the workers — of the thought and the action of that fertile laboring class . . . (for whom) his sturdy Sureño machete had been flashed many a time.’ Guerrero was at the root of the 1910 struggle because ‘he was the precursor of the agrarianism that redistributes the land to the enslaved peasant.’ Guerrero would also appear to have a link with the Zapatista rebels of the 1990s in Chiapas, who claim to struggle for the goals illuminated in 1910!”

“Vicente Guerrero was the foremost surviving military hero of Mexico’s wars of independence, and one of the few great figures who had fought for independence throughout the entire period of 1810 to 1821, when many other military and political leaders changed sides repeatedly. He served with distinction in the first two governments of independent Mexico, and then in 1829 became the second president of the republic. ... For the specialist, Vincent’s book adds nothing new about Guerrero himself. He does, however, have a very solid point, if too frequently repeated, that Guerrero’s dark skin color and determination to incorporate the masses into the new republic made him a figure of fear for the white elite in central Mexico, which in turn guaranteed he would be one of the overlooked figures in the early historiography. ... He was perhaps Mexico’s first genuine revolutionary. He was a congenial man, personally honorable and dedicated to his people, his soldiers, and his family. He was catapulted into the presidency, possibly against his wishes, by a people’s uprising in Mexico City after he lost the 1828 presidential election (at the time, the president was elected by the

state legislatures). Though president less than a year, he abolished slavery, expelled the Spaniards from the country, and successfully fought off an attempted Spanish invasion in 1829. His vice president, Anastasio Bustamante, allied with the most conservative forces of central Mexico, betrayed and overthrew him in 1830. He was treacherously captured and executed in 1831.”

“During his brief tenure, Guerrero managed to defend Mexico from an attempt by the Spanish to reconquer the nation. To defend his motherland, however, he exhausted the nation’s back up financial resources, which was met with disapproval from the country’s aristocracy. However, Guerrero made remarkable changes to support working classes, despite the serious economic limitations. He granted rights for indigenous peoples, fought for both racially and economically oppressed people, and promoted the purchase of Mexican products. His government was clearly dedicated to the people who had many needs after years and years of conflict that left the nation with a predominantly poor class. On September 16, 1829, to celebrate the anniversary of independence with an act of justice, Guerrero formally abolished slavery in Mexico, except in the Isthmus of Tehuantepec in the south of the country. This monumental declaration, however, would lead to his downfall. Many people, especially the wealthy class, opposed his populist egalitarian idea, and even members of his administration opposed and betrayed him. More so, Euro-American enslavers, especially in Texas, did not like the idea of losing the economic power they had based on slavery. At the time, Texas was still part of the Republic of Mexico, and Guerrero’s order arrived in Texas October 16, but political chief Ramon Musquiz’ workers rejected it because it violated the colonization laws that secured the settlers properties. Unfortunately, Guerrero’s decree did not make any changes over slavery in Texas. This ultimately became a reason why Texas decided to secede from Mexico and join the United States, which still practiced slavery. After three months of his declaration, Guerrero was driven out of office. His own officials said that he did not possess the intellectual capacities to govern a nation, and he was forced to resign. Guerrero fled to southern Mexico, fearing for his life. However, Anastasio Bustamante, his

vice president, ordered his assassination without a legal trial. On February 14, 1831, Gurrerero was found and killed at the age of 39 in Cuilapam, Oaxaca.”

There is a vast diversity among this population, which even includes people of African descent. ... ‘LULAC rises to join in steadfast solidarity with the hundreds of thousands of people across our country demanding fundamental reforms to our law enforcement system,’ Garcia said in his statement. ‘We stand as one with this movement in strong agreement that we must change how law enforcement is carried out in America.’”

phenomenon has caused the Latinx community to feel victimized by the Black community. ... Some Latinx people have recognized the connection between Black and Brown oppression and responded in profound ways. At the Mesa Verde Immigration and Customs Enforcement detention facility in Bakersfield, people went on a [hunger strike partly in honor of Black Lives Matter](#) and Floyd, Taylor, Oscar Grant and Tony McDade — Black people who were killed by police. The four-day hunger strike was part of ongoing protests against ICE and efforts to align the immigrants' cause with the broader fight for justice and against corrupt justice officials.”

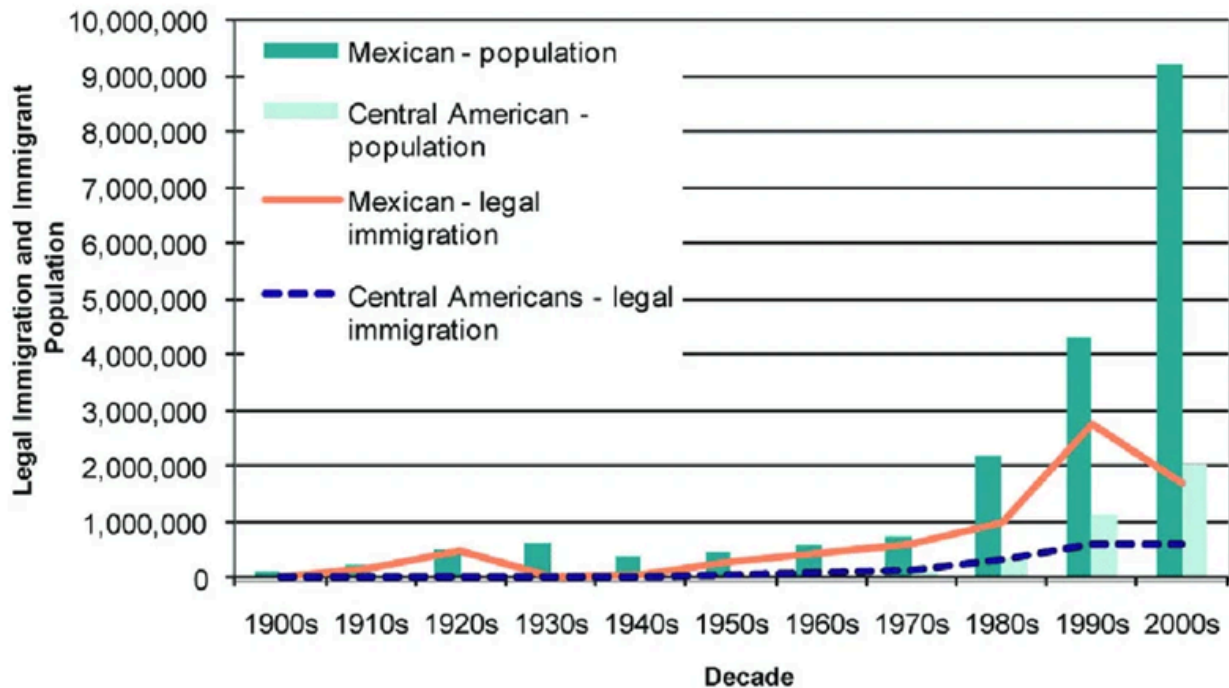

“The League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC), founded in 1929, is the oldest and most widely respected Hispanic civil rights organization in the United States of America. LULAC was created at a time in our country's history when Hispanics were denied basic civil and human rights, despite contributions to American society. The founders of LULAC created an organization that empowers its members to create and develop opportunities where they are needed most. In 1945, a California LULAC Council successfully sued to integrate the Orange County School System, which had been segregated on the grounds that Mexican children were ‘more poorly clothed and mentally inferior to white children.’ Additionally, in 1954, LULAC brought another landmark case, Hernandez vs. the State of Texas, to protest the fact that a Mexican American had never been called

to jury duty in the state of Texas. The Supreme Court ruled this exclusion unconstitutional. Since then, LULAC has fought for full access to the political process and equal educational opportunity for all Hispanics. LULAC's continues to play an active role in these efforts. LULAC councils across the United States hold voter registration drives, citizenship awareness sessions, sponsor health fairs and tutorial programs, and raise scholarship money for the LULAC National Scholarship Fund. This fund, in conjunction with LNESEC (LULAC National Educational Service Centers), has assisted almost 10 percent of the 1.1 million Hispanic students who have gone to college."

When comparing the contemporary segregation of Mexican Americans to that of Black Americans, some scholars claim that "Hispanic segregation is less severe and fundamentally different from Black residential segregation." suggesting that the segregation faced by Latinos is more likely to be due to factors such as lower socioeconomic status and immigration while the segregation of African Americans is more likely to be due to larger issues of the history of racism in the US.

Legally, Mexican Americans could vote and hold elected office, however, it was not until the creation of organizations such as the League of United Latin America Citizens and the G.I. Forum that Mexican Americans began to achieve political influence. Edward Roybal's election to the Los Angeles City Council in 1949 and then to Congress in 1962 also represented this rising Mexican American political power. In the late 1960s the founding of the Crusade for Justice in Denver in and the land grant movement in New Mexico in 1967 set the bases for what would become the Chicano (Mexican American) nationalism. The 1968 Los Angeles school walkouts expressed Mexican American demands to end segregation, increase graduation rates, and reinstate a teacher fired for supporting student organizing. A notable event in the Chicano movement was the 1972 Convention of

La Raza Unida (United People) Party, which organized with the goal of creating a third party that would give Chicanos political power in the United States.

In the past, Mexicans were legally considered "White" because either they were considered to be of full Spanish heritage, or because of early treaty obligations to Spaniards and Mexicans that conferred citizenship status to Mexican peoples at a time when whiteness was a prerequisite for US citizenship. Although Mexican Americans were legally classified as "White" in terms of official federal policy, many organizations, businesses, and homeowners associations and local legal systems had official policies to exclude Mexican Americans. Throughout the southwest discrimination in wages were institutionalized in "white wages" versus lower "Mexican wages" for the same job classifications. For Mexican Americans, opportunities for employment were largely limited to guest worker programs. The bracero program, which began in 1942 and officially ended in 1964, allowed them temporary entry into the United States as migrant workers in farms throughout California and the Southwest.

Mexican Americans legally classified as "White", following anti-miscegenation laws in most western states until the 1960s, could not legally marry African or Asian Americans (See *Perez v. Sharp*). However, most were not socially considered white, and therefore, according to Historian Neil Foley in the book *The White Scourge: Mexicans, Blacks, and Poor Whites in Texas Cotton Culture*, Mexicans and Mexican-Americans did marry non-whites typically without reprisal.

Despite the similarities between Mexican American and African American patterns of segregation, there were important differences. The racial demarcations between whites and blacks in a state like Texas were inviolable, whereas those between whites and Mexican Americans were not. It was possible for Mexican Americans to attend white schools and colleges, mix socially with whites and marry whites: all of these things were impossible for African Americans, largely due to the legalized nature of black-white segregation. Racial segregation was rarely as rigid for Mexican Americans as it was for African Americans, even in situations where African Americans enjoyed higher economic status than Mexican Americans.

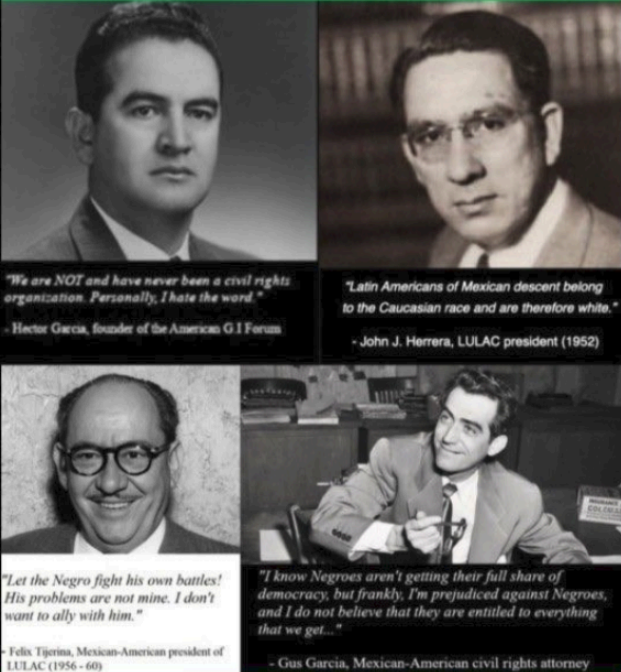

“Firstly, birthright citizenship, which is described in the Fourteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, came directly out of the experience of enslaved African people and descendants of African people being granted U.S. citizenship after the end of the period of enslavement in the United States. The Fourteenth Amendment established that if you are born in the United States, you are entitled to citizenship in the United States. Prior to that, all enslaved Black people in the United States were not only considered not fully human, they were certainly not part of the group of people who could have the rights and privileges of citizenship.”

“A hundred years ago this month, for instance, Congress passed the Immigration Act of 1917, effectively banning Asian, Mexican and Mediterranean people from entering the United States, along with the poor, political radicals and those with mental or physical disabilities. Seven years later, Congress passed the Immigration Act of 1924, also known as the Asian Exclusion Act. The law created a quota system that prioritized immigrants from Northern and Western Europe, drastically restricted immigrants from Southern and Eastern Europe and Africa, and completely banned Arabs, Asians and Indians. The law's stated purpose was to ‘preserve the idea of American homogeneity.’ At the same time U.S. policy was restricting immigration by people of color, it was denying full citizenship rights to native-born people of African descent whose ancestors had been forced into bondage. It robbed them of their voting rights, deprived them of labor rights, and forced them into segregated facilities. Then came the civil rights movement. When four African-American college students from North Carolina's A&T University sat down at a segregated Woolworth's lunch counter in Greensboro 57 years ago this

week, they ignited a movement that brought down Jim Crow and led to the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and Voting Rights Act of 1965. But the movement did not end there: It also played a role in ending the race-based immigration quota system. As the civil rights movement gained momentum in the 1960s, it made the idea of America as a white nation increasingly unacceptable. Just a few months after passing the Voting Rights Act, Congress passed the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1965, abolishing the race-based immigration quota system and replacing it with a system that prioritized refugees, people with special skills, and those with family members living in the United States. It also forbade discrimination in the issuance of immigrant visas on the basis of race, sex, nationality, place of birth, or place of residence.”

I believe these comments capture the feelings of most Blacks

- I used to believe that we were alike—Black and Mexican communities—until I joined the military. That’s when my perspective started to shift. My roommate, who was Mexican, and I became great friends, but he was the first to tell me outright that many Mexicans don’t like Black people. At first, I brushed it off as just his opinion, but then I heard the same sentiment from another Mexican guy who was clearly on some anti-Black rhetoric. He told me, “We don’t mess with Black people like that. And if one of our women dates a Black guy, she’ll be chastised for it.” That stuck with me. And as I continued talking to other Black people, I realized this wasn’t just an isolated experience. Many of them had similar stories—being treated with hostility, being told outright that Mexicans didn’t like them, or witnessing the divide firsthand. So when people talk about unity between Black and Mexican communities, I have to be real about it: it’s not on us as Black people to bridge that gap. We’ve always been open to working together, to building alliances. But if there’s tension, it’s not because we’ve been the ones pushing others away. It’s the other way around. That’s the part that needs to be addressed.

They felt like they were better because they all worked for the actual company and weren't Black. They had all there family

members working and would start shit with the brotha's to get them fired from the job. Knowing that the Construction jobs pay better than the other jobs! Them haters didn't want to see us with shit but struggle!!! SMH!!!
