### **Document Purpose**

This document will be used to capture all of the content for the Alameda County Health Health Care for the Homeless Division division website. We will use this document as a "working document" for content creation so that we have a single source of truth for website content that can be used as we gather and define the website's content. Where possible, please include hyperlinks to other websites or other materials that are to be linked to from the website.

#### **Content Definitions**

We think about content in 4 main categories: Core Content, Updates, Resources, and Events. While there isn't always a completely objective way of classifying content, we have created this framework based on a wide range of input, and we believe that this framework will help us organize the content in a way that is most meaningful for website visitors, who represent a wide range of use cases.

#### **Core Content**

Core content is content that is "Evergreen" and should not change that often. In many cases, core content serves to "introduce" other content objects such as a set of web pages, updates, or resources.

Examples of Core Content include:

- Who we are
- What we do
- Mission, Vision, and Values
- Contact Us

Generally speaking, most core content has a short description field (1-2 sentences), and an opportunity for expanded content.



#### **Updates**

Updates are "timely" pieces of content that provide information that is important for people to receive. Updates have a taxonomy that classifies them in a meaningful way, which will allow us to populate them into the website:

- Type:
  - 0 Alert
  - Advisory 0
  - News 0
  - Health Order 0
- Topic:
  - Can be assigned any number of potential topics that the update relates to 0
- Date:
  - The date of the update
- Audience:
  - For Providers
  - o For everyone else
- Department
  - Department the update is coming from

Updates have a short (1-2 sentence) content area where you can describe the resource.

The easiest way to think about "Updates" is that they are like blog posts that have certain classifications on them. Once we generate an initial list of updates, we can work on classifying them later. Updates are content only, and not file-based, although an update can include hyperlinks.



#### Resources

Resources are materials that are useful to website visitors and are curated at key places in the website. While they do have a date associated with them, they are not primarily defined as being time-dependent, but are more defined by their title, topic, type, and other associations.

Resources have a short (1 sentence) content area where you can describe the resource.

Resources can come in a variety of formats:

- External Link
- Self-Hosted (HTML)
- Video
- File (PPT, Word, ZIP)

		Street outreach and engagement are critical components of responding to the homeless crisis in our community. Outreach "brings the front door" to our unsheltered residents, and engagement activities foster relationships that can allow individuals to consider coming inside and accepting services. Alameda County Health Care for the Homeless (ACHCH) Street Health services seeks to address the health disparities experienced by homeless residents of Alameda County.	
		Street Health teams provide access to care from multi-disciplinary teams that meet the unique needs of people experiencing homelessness through regularly scheduled outreach services offered to unsheltered people living in homeless encampments, vehicles, and RVs. Street Health teams engage people living on the streets with highly accessible, patient-centered care. They strive to build relationships that lead to long-term health through connections to primary care, social services, housing, and other resources.	

Currently, Street Health teams operate through contracts with LifeLong Medical Care, Tiburcio Vasquez Health Center, and Bay Area Community Health to provide Street Health services in defined geographic regions in Oakland, Hayward, Castro Valley, and Fremont. Sites and schedules evolve based on the shifting geography of homelessness.

ACHCH Street Health teams directly provide street psychiatry and substance use recovery services to unsheltered people sleeping on the streets in the Oakland area, linking many people to the Trust Health Center.

ACHCH Street Health teams do not provide mobile crisis services.

		Extremely hot weather can be very harmful to homeless people – it can be just as bad or worse than the cold.	
		During the COVID-19 emergency, unsheltered people might not be able to access traditional cooling centers such as libraries, senior centers, and other public facilities, which increases the threat of heat-related illness.	

#### **Street Outreach Providers**

Alameda County Health Care for the Homeless (ACHCH) urges all city, county, and community outreach providers to make special efforts to provide outreach to unsheltered people by visiting street and encampment sites, providing bottled water if possible, and, most importantly, carrying out wellness checks for people who may be experiencing heat-related illness. #### Symptoms of Heat-Related Illness

Extremely high body temperature (103°+), difficulty breathing, red hot, dry skin (no sweating), dizziness, fatigue, rapid pulse, nausea, confusion, faintness, headaches, muscle cramps, and unconsciousness are all symptoms. If you experience these symptoms, seek medical attention.

#### Be Careful!

Heat and sun are threats to the aging population, babies and children, disabled persons, people with medical conditions or who take medication, and people who drink or use drugs.

#### Be Aware!

Check on your neighbors, especially those unhoused. If you see someone passed out or not feeling well, don't think they're "just drunk." They could be suffering or dying from a

heat-related illness. Check on them to make sure they are okay. Call 9-1-1 and get them help if needed.

#### Wellness Checks!

Outreach agencies and concerned neighbors need to reach out to people they know who could be at risk for heat-related illness. Bring water and check on people to make sure they are okay in the heat.

#### Water!

People on the streets don't have ready access to water. It is both compassionate and useful to provide bottled water, sunscreen, hats, and umbrellas for protection. Street outreach providers who need access to cases of water to distribute should call ACHCH at (510) 891-8950 for more information.

#### Animals!

Pets also suffer from heat-related illnesses. Give them plenty of shade and water and protect their paws from hot pavement. Click here for more information on how to keep your pets safe this summer.

#### Cooling Center!

A cooling center is a facility, such as a senior center, community center, or library, where people may go to get out of life-threatening heat during a heat wave. Cooling centers are for everyone, especially those at risk of getting a heat-related illness. In this COVID-19 emergency, many cooling center sites may not be functioning. Please call the cooling center nearest you for hours of operation during hot weather.

#### Wildfire Smoke & Your Health FAQ

Alameda County has a list of clean air facilities and cooling centers to take refuge from unhealthy air quality.

We also urge everyone to sign up for Alameda County Emergency Alert (AC Alert) to receive updates via text or email.

When dangerous and unhealthy air quality settles upon the county, all residents, especially aging people, children and people with medical conditions, are put at high risk.

Review current Countywide guidance when air levels are in the "unhealthy" or higher range. The best option for everyone, especially children, the elderly, and persons with chronic breathing or heart issues, is to stay indoors with windows and doors closed and limit or avoid outdoor activities. Alameda County has a list of clean air facilities and cooling centers to take refuge from unhealthy air quality.

- There is no clear evidence that N95 respirator masks used by the general public are beneficial to a person's health during a poor air quality event, and they can actually make it harder for some people to breathe.
- N95 masks or higher are a last resort for people without access to safer indoor filtered air.
- According to statewide air mask guidance, some specific masks (N95s or higher) may be helpful for those who must be outdoors for long periods, but they must fit well and provide a tight seal around the wearer's mouth and nose to be effective.
- N95 masks require a tight seal to work, so they may not protect men with beards or young children.
- Persons with chronic breathing or heart issues or other medical conditions should check with their health care provider before using an N95 mask, as they can make breathing more difficult.
- Bandanas (wet or dry), paper or surgical masks, or tissues held over the mouth and nose will not

protect from wildfire smoke or small particulate matter in the air.

People living outdoors, in tents, or on the streets should exercise special caution. Best practice is to get indoors, especially in places where there is ventilation and air filters. Click here for county-wide cooling centers such as libraries, shelters, and cooling centers normally used in case of heat emergencies but equally effective during times of bad air quality. For a list of clean air facilities, click here. Please check to see if these resources are open before going.

Another tip for unsheltered persons is to wear appropriate particulate filter masks, such as an N95 mask. If air quality is projected to be at dangerous levels (red) for a sustained period of time, county, city, outreach workers, and community volunteers may distribute N95 air masks to unsheltered persons at risk. To receive or help distribute filter masks, please email us at achch@acgov.org. Masks provide limited but important protection to people in the open air—however, it's best to stay indoors.

ACHCH will continue to work closely with our partners in the Alameda County Public Health Department (ACPHD) to coordinate responses and communicate with our community partners. Positive cases (or "case counts"), hospitalizations, outbreaks, and wastewater monitoring all inform countywide responses to COVID-19. County Health Officer and ACHCH guidance will be posted on our webpages and actionable updates to guidance will be emailed to our provider community.

The following ACHCH Homeless Provider guidance is aligned with the more detailed and informative ACPHD Preventing & Controlling Outbreaks in Unlicensed Congregate Living Facilities guidance.

### Vaccination to protect against COVID-19 and Flu

Staying up-to-date with all recommended COVID-19 vaccine doses is the best way to protect against serious illness and death caused by COVID-19. For information on where to get vaccinated, visit the Alameda County Community Vaccination Clinics. If your site is interested in potentially hosting a mobile vaccination team, submit a request here.

### **Screening for Contagious Illness**

Shelter and homeless services provider staff should screen program participants AND staff daily for symptoms of potentially contagious illnesses and maintain a log of participant and staff screenings:

- Shelters should accept clients with symptoms and/or who are positive for COVID-19 if the risks of transmission can be mitigated on-site.
- Post signs reminding staff and visitors of the importance of masking, hand hygiene, and symptoms of COVID-19.

## Testing for COVID-19

Shelter and homeless services providers can have over-the-counter (OTC) COVID-19 rapid test kits available for staff and residents to use. Larger-scale screening testing of possibly exposed asymptomatic people may be recommended when Alameda County CDC COVID-19 levels are medium or high or when there is an active outbreak in your facility.

- You can register with the Alameda County Emergency Services warehouse to order free OTC rapid COVID-19 test kits. In the Resources section, you can "Create Account and Request COVID-19 Supplies." Supplies are limited.
- Homeless Services Providers can access OTC rapid COVID-19 test kits from the ACHCH program. To order and pick up, please contact a Regional Coordinator in your region or email achch@acgov.org.
- Get familiar with and share tips and techniques for self-testing with resources from the ACPHD COVID-19 website.
- Community testing is still available in Alameda County. Many of these sites provide PCR and rapid testing, free test kits, onsite COVID-19 treatment, and health care enrollment and other services.
- Clients who are symptomatic but test negative should be retested at least once, ideally three times in total.
- Clients with persistent symptoms who are COVID-19 negative should be referred to a health care setting for assessment, including testing for influenza.

### Treatment for COVID-19 and Flu

Don't delay treatment for COVID-19. Be prepared to help staff and/or participants contact their health care providers AS SOON AS THEY TEST POSITIVE. Treatment is effective and free.

People who are uninsured or can't reach their provider can speak with a health care provider for FREE by phone at (833) 686-5051 (6 a.m. – 4 p.m. PST, seven days a week) or by video appointment at <u>sesamecare.com/covidca</u>.

There are also treatments available for influenza. Staff and/or participants should be supported in contacting their primary care provider.

### Respond to Positive COVID-19 Cases

First steps for someone who is confirmed to be COVID-19 positive are to (1) provide a well-fitting mask or respirator for the ill individual (or PWC – person with Covid) to wear at all times, (2) separate the ill individual from others as much as possible, especially those at risk for severe disease, (3) refer ill individual for antiviral treatment, (4) provide KN95 masks to those individuals with unavoidable close contact with ill individual(s).

### **Shelter or Program Participants:**

- A resident or client with symptoms of possible COVID-19 should be masked and placed in a separate space and tested for COVID-19. If a person tests positive for COVID-19, they should follow instructions for <u>isolation</u> from CDPH and CDC.
- Facilities should be prepared to accept and isolate residents on-site who either have or are symptomatic for COVID-19. Ideally, a client would be placed in a private room or co-horted in a room with other COVID-19-positive clients to avoid the spread of the virus within a facility. The client should wear a well-fitting mask or respirator when using shared facilities such as restrooms.
- If a designated space for isolation is not available, reduce transmission by optimizing ventilation in the infected client's area and maximizing the physical distance between the infected client and others. Work to clearly separate more medically fragile or vulnerable residents from potentially infected persons.

#### Staff:

Staff with symptoms of possible COVID-19 should be excused from on-site work around other people pending COVID-19 test results. If symptoms persist, consider self-isolation and retesting daily for two days as recommended by CDPH.

- Staff who test positive for COVID-19 must be excluded from the workplace until they meet all return-to-work requirements.

### **Reporting COVID-19 Cases:**

- One to four COVID-19 cases: Providers may choose to inform the ACHCH program of COVID-19 cases at their facility. This will help our surveillance efforts and ACHCH staff support providers with their questions or concerns.

### **Improve Ventilation and Physical Distancing**

Improving Ventilation

Services providers can develop on-site isolation and risk-mitigation capacity using the toolkits below. Healthy strategies that mix, filter, and dilute the air in your facility reduce the risk of airborne transmission of infectious diseases such as COVID-19. RSV. Flu. and colds:

- ACHCH Ventilation Toolkit (Appendix 5) and online training.
- CDPH Best Practices for Ventilation of Isolation Areas.
- Ensure that your facility is using Portable Air Cleaners to filter air and protect staff and residents. Enroll in the ACHCH BAAQMD Clean Air Center program to access portable air cleaners.

### **Maintain Distancing**

Ensure that physical distancing is carried out as much as possible:

- Beds should be positioned head to toe, with heads positioned as far apart as possible.
- Consider serving meals or gathering people in a staggered manner to reduce the number of people crowded together.
- Review the above toolkits for more details on physical distancing in shelter and congregate settings.

### **Masking for Shelter Staff and Residents**

Shelter and homeless service programs should purchase KN95 and surgical masks for use when indicated to prevent the spread of respiratory illnesses. Masking is not currently mandatory but may be helpful in limiting the spread of any respiratory illnesses.

- Anyone who is coughing or sneezing should wear at least a surgical mask around other people and while in an indoor congregate setting.
- People with positive COVID-19 tests should continue wearing a well-fitted mask until 10 days after symptoms began.
- Anyone who has close and regular contact with someone symptomatic should consider wearing a KN95 mask.
- Anyone, especially those at very high risk for severe respiratory disease, should consider wearing a KN95 mask in crowded indoor settings.

- Clients and staff may be required to wear masks during an outbreak or in times of high community transmission. County indoor mask-wearing rules and recommendations will change based on conditions. Updates are posted here.
- You can register with the Alameda County Emergency Services warehouse to access COVID-19 PPE and other supplies when available (see "Testing for COVID-19" and "Resources" sections for link).

		Air Quality in Homeless Shelters and Service Centers	
		Improving indoor air quality in congregate shelter, housing, and service centers is a key strategy to reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19 and other infectious diseases that are transmitted through the air.	
		Adequate ventilation and filtration are important ways to improve indoor air quality. Improving the quality of indoor air with ventilation and filtration decreases the number of airborne viruses and other infectious particles that accumulate in the air of our shared spaces, helping to reduce the airborne transmission of COVID-19 and other viruses or germs such as influenza, colds, and tuberculosis. This creates a healthier and more protective environment for staff, residents, and visitors.	
		Improving air quality is just ONE part of creating a healthy environment!	
		Shelter and congregate providers work on multiple levels to create environments that reduce	



the risk of transmission of airborne diseases among residents and staff in homeless congregate settings. Some of the key lessons we have learned during the COVID-19 pandemic will continue to be used now and into the future:

		Alameda County Health Care for the Homeless (ACHCH) is a program of Alameda County. We coordinate a network of health centers and community-based organizations to increase access and improve care for people experiencing homelessness in Alameda County. We work closely with our contractors and community partners to strengthen services, and in some cases, ACHCH staff directly provides care alongside staff from contracting organizations.	
		Health Care Services	
		Since 1988, ACHCH has provided health care and case management services to persons experiencing homelessness throughout Alameda County. Current services include comprehensive <u>primary care</u> with integrated behavioral health at sites throughout Alameda County, <u>urgent care</u> and <u>street medicine</u> at shelters and on the streets, <u>substance use</u> outreach and treatment, specialty medical care, <u>dental</u> and optical care, and case management. In 2018, ACHCH provided 45,035 medical and social support service encounters to 9,987 people experiencing homelessness throughout Alameda County.	

## Policy Research and Education

ACHCH researches key policy issues and educates community members and policymakers. Policy analysis is rooted in direct service experience and informed by the perspectives and involvement of our clients, staff, board members, and community partners. ACHCH supports equity in health care and housing through our Community Consumer Advisory Board, involvement in County and statewide initiatives, including coordination and prioritization of permanent supportive housing, and energetic participation in the National Health Care for the Homeless Council.

### Communicable Illnesses in Street and Shelter Locations

Alameda County Health Care for the Homeless (ACHCH) works closely with the Alameda County Public Health Department's Division of Communicable Disease Control & Prevention (DCDCP) in an effort to prevent transmission of communicable diseases and respond to incidences of communicable diseases in shelters, homeless service centers, and in street/encampment settings in Alameda County.

ACHCH and DCDCP have jointly developed a toolkit to support homeless service providers in carrying out the fundamental strategies to prevent communicable diseases in shelters, streets and homeless services centers:

- 1. Create an internal process to identify outbreaks or incidences of communicable diseases.
- 2. Educate staff and residents to recognize specific disease patterns.
- 3. Document cases of similar etiology/symptoms with sufficient details to track the source of the disease outbreak.
- 4. Rapidly implement measures to control the spread of illness based on the mode of

- transmission of suspected infectious disease, including isolation, PPE use, hand hygiene, cleaning, and disinfection.
- 5. Notification to ACHCH and the local health department of an outbreak to secure expertise and help in managing the outbreak.

The summit was convened to bring together County and City officials, policymakers, advocates, and the people experiencing homelessness in Alameda County. They spent the day discussing solutions to homelessness and recognizing that we're all in this together, even though we have separate and distinct jurisdictional responsibilities. Watch a

Our most recent Needs Assessment was carried out in 2015, updated in 2018, and is based on the evaluation of a variety of utilization, survey and research data.

- Development Without Displacement (2014) presents the health impacts of rising housing costs which are pushing lower-income Alameda County residents out of their communities.
- Without Housing (2010), published by the Western Regional Advocacy Project, focuses on the primary reason so many people are homeless in the United States today: the near elimination of the federal government's commitment to building, maintaining, and subsidizing affordable housing.
- Rebuilding Neighborhoods, Restoring Health: A Report on the Impacts of Housing Foreclosures on Public Health (2010) describes the health and economic impacts that foreclosures have had on individual residents and neighborhoods in Oakland, roots the current crisis in the history of housing discrimination, and provides recommendations to help mitigate and prevent further health impacts.
