## **Practice Presentation Guidelines**

- 1. Choose a particular feature of a different culture from yours (real-life situation)
  - a. i.e., arranged marriage, religious fasting, bullfighting, etc
  - b. Choose something you are NOT familiar with
- 2. Briefly describe the event, belief, practice, etc. (one paragraph written/typed)
  - a. Where and when does/did it exist?
  - b. Why does/did it exist?
- 3. Extract a Knowledge Question from the RLS.
  - a. General, open-ended, and about knowledge
  - b. The KQ should *not* reveal your RLS
- 4. Explore the KQ using AOKs and WOKs we have discussed (at least one of each)
  - a. "Explore" means discuss the aspects of knowledge, providing arguments and examples
  - b. Discuss AOKs and WOKs explicitly
  - c. Offer multiple perspectives
- 5. Relate what you learned from the KQ back to the RLS
  - a. During or after step 4
- 6. Time the presentation carefully; you only have 5-6 minutes
  - a. 1 minute: explain RLS
  - b. 3-4 minutes: explore KQ (and provide an answer)
  - c. 1 minute: wrap up, relate back to RLS
- 7. Visual aid
  - a. Powerpoint or slideshow recommended
  - b. No videos, but you may include pictures, charts, graphs, etc.
  - c. Do not just read from cards or powerpoint
