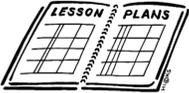


# Performance Standards Observation Guide

|  <p><b>Performance Standard 1</b><br/>Knowledge of Curriculum, Subject Content, and Developmental Needs</p> | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Addresses all elements of the standard</li> <li>● Utilizes the curriculum map to align the learning target and to develop instructional plans</li> <li>● Explains the connection of the content to the real world</li> <li>● Prepares for the content delivery using content knowledge and knowledge of students</li> <li>● Incorporates a variety of depth of knowledge (DOK) questions leading to higher level thinking</li> <li>● Reviews supplemental documents and permanent records to identify the needs for each student (IEP, 504, LEP)</li> </ul>  | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Relies heavily on the textbook for information and/or the ancillary materials</li> <li>● Relies heavily on worksheets</li> <li>● Teaches or states incorrect information</li> <li>● Teaching strays from lesson topic</li> <li>● Presents information that is not challenging or is too difficult</li> <li>● Homework is not aligned with lesson objectives and/or standards</li> <li>● Bell ringer/starter assignment not integrated</li> <li>● Repeatedly re-visits learned content</li> <li>● Lacks the ability to link past, present, and future learning</li> <li>● Does not base instruction on the goal of high expectations and understanding of the subject matter</li> </ul>   |
|  <p><b>Performance Standard 2</b><br/>Instructional Planning</p>   | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Aligns instructional plans to the curriculum standards</li> <li>● Aligns and plans assignments with the rigor of the content standards</li> <li>● Includes a variety of technology (Example - Jamboard, Pear Deck)</li> <li>● Includes learning targets, activating strategies, instructional delivery, and summary or assessment in lesson</li> <li>● Plans differentiated instruction and provides differentiated resources</li> <li>● Plans for varied developmental and instructional needs (IEP, 504, LEP) of all students</li> <li>● Plans assignments that include writing</li> <li>● Designs activities, assignments, and assessments to measure student learning</li> </ul> | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● No written lesson plans or unit plan evident</li> <li>● Heavily relies on one resource for instructional planning</li> <li>● No evidence of standards and/or curriculum guides used in planning</li> <li>● No evidence of planning for special needs students, high achievers, and/or ESOL students</li> <li>● Planned instructional strategies do not match the lesson objectives, standards, and/or the content</li> <li>● No evidence of subject integration in planning</li> <li>● Activities, homework, assessments, and/or bell ringers do not correlate with standards</li> <li>● Plans for re-teaching are not included</li> <li>● The scope and sequence timeline of instructional delivery is not being followed</li> <li>● Essential question or lesson objective is not posted or addressed in the lesson plans</li> </ul> |



**Performance  
Standard 3  
Instructional  
Delivery**

- Appropriately paces instruction for student learning
- Uses modifications that meets the needs of the students
- Discusses prior learning and connection to future learning
- Summarizes lessons at the conclusion of the instructional time
- Uses technology integration, and resources to provide learning experiences
- Asks questions and seeks student input that provides multiple perspectives and viewpoints
- Intentionally develops and utilizes varied instructional group arrangements to meet varying student needs
- Uses activities that teach and reinforce problem solving

- Uses an overabundance of worksheets/drill
- Students are inattentive and/or not on task
- Very little student involvement and/or integration
- Limited use of resources and technology
- Does not encourage student involvement
- Instructional pacing is not matched to the developmental and ability levels of the students
- Relevance of the learning is not evident
- Does not state/clarify the objective and/or does not summarize the learning
- Does not correlate current learning to past and/or future instruction
- The majority of instruction is teacher-directed
- Does not monitor and adjust instruction to address student needs during the lesson



**Performance  
Standard 4  
Assessment**

- Uses formative assessments to determine student learning needs
- Uses summative assessments to determine mastery
- Provides academic feedback to students
- Uses rubrics and other student learning tools
- Consistently and continually uses informal assessment
- Asks clarifying questions during teaching and before assignments

- Textbook assessments only
- Incomplete or unclear method of recording grades
- Lack of a variety of questions, including higher order thinking questions in assessments
- Feedback is not provided in a timely manner
- No evidence of student work is provided
- Assessment not aligned to standards
- Assessments are only paper/pencil
- No evidence of reinforcing or re-teaching
- Insufficient number of types and grades as required by district guidelines



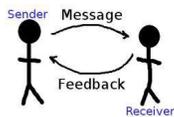
**Performance  
Standard 5  
Learning  
Environment**

- Engages students in the development of a classroom management (social contract) plan that outlines expectations
- Establishes a welcoming, trusting, and supportive environment where positive relationships and student interactions maximize learning for all

- Ridicule and/or sarcasm are displayed by the teacher
- Disrespect and other inappropriate student behaviors are not addressed properly
- Cluttered or unorganized classroom conditions
- Transitions are not quick and smooth
- Student work is not displayed

- Provides opportunities for students to work on building relationships
- Models mutual respect, caring, fairness, and enthusiasm for learning
- Demonstrates enthusiasm about learning and models in lesson delivery
- Develops a schedule that maximizes instruction time
- Plans activities that are rigorous, but allows all students to learn
- Displays current and relevant student work

- Classroom rules and/or non-instructional procedures are not visible or consistently enforced
- Lack of support for the developmental needs of students
- The classroom is unsafe or hazardous
- The classroom management plan provided is not implemented consistently or with fidelity



**Performance Standard 6 Communication**

- Communicates directions, concepts, and lesson content clearly and accurately
- Written and oral communication is error free
- Follows school policy on return calls
- Uses multiple methods to communicate (phone, email, newsletter, technology such as Class Dojo, Backpack, Remind)
- Provides students and parents multiple opportunities to discuss student progress and concerns throughout the year
- Notifies parents of and supports school events
- Shares information with parents and guardians in a timely manner

- Grammatical, spelling, and pronunciation errors in communication
- Communicates content incorrectly
- Handwriting is not legible
- Lack of ability to communicate clearly and coherently with parents and/or students
- Failure to acknowledge parental and student concerns
- Inadequate/unclear directives and/or explanations given
- Lack of a variety of communication tools used (i.e. e-mail contact as the only tool of parent communication)
- Inconsistent feedback to parents regarding student progress and needs



**Performance Standard 7 Professionalism**

- Professional demeanor and behavior is aligned with the school and district expectations
- Maintains two way communication process with all stakeholders
- Attendance is consistent
- All requirements completed efficiently and in a timely manner

- Lack of participation in professional settings, in-services, and workshops
- Negative interaction in professional settings, in-services, and workshops
- Inappropriate relationship parameters between teacher and students
- Unprofessional appearance or dress code violations
- Attendance problems

|  <p><b>Performance<br/>Standard 8<br/>Student<br/>Achievement</b></p> | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Sets measurable achievement goals for student progress</li> <li>● Creates goals that can be measured through multiple data points</li> <li>● Shows students are meeting learning targets</li> <li>● Uses goals and achievement data to plan for instruction</li> <li>● Analyzes the data to inform instructional decisions and planning</li> <li>● Monitors student progress through formative assessments</li> <li>● Provides evidence of progress toward meeting learning targets</li> </ul> | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Lack of knowledge of student achievement</li> <li>● Unclear/inappropriate goals</li> <li>● Lack of formative assessments</li> <li>● No baseline data</li> <li>● Lack of evidence that achievement goals have been met</li> <li>● No mid-year review data or statement</li> </ul> |
