

Los Angeles Extreme Heat Campaign

Extreme heat is already a deadly threat in the Los Angeles region and projections show a tenfold increase in the annual number of heat waves by mid- century. Risk for heat related illness increases for children, pregnant people, outdoor workers, people experiencing homelessness, and older adults, among others.

In June 2022, the Los Angeles Regional Collaborative (LARC) and the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (LACDPH) partnered to launch a <u>social media campaign</u> to help those most at risk for heat related illness to protect themselves, their families, and their communities. Los Angeles Department of Water & Power (LADWP):

<u>Financial Assistance</u> - LADWP offers a number of discount and special rate programs designed to provide assistance to low income families, senior citizens, and the disabled. Use the <u>Financial Assistance Qualification Form</u> to see if you qualify for one of these programs.

<u>Payment Arrangements</u> - Pay your late utility water and energy bills through installments.

Southern California Edison:

<u>Discounted Rates</u> - California Alternate Rates for Energy (CARE) reduces energy bills for eligible customers by about 30%. Family Electric Rate Assistance (FERA) reduces electric bills for qualified households by 18%. Both programs have the same application and it only takes 2 minutes to sign up with no additional documentation required.

<u>One-Time Bill Assistance</u> - SCE works with United Way and over 80 community-based <u>organizations</u>, which help qualified customers apply for assistance.

SoCalGas:

<u>California Alternate Rates for Energy (CARE)</u>: Receive a 20 percent discount on your natural gas bill if you qualify.

<u>Past Due Bill Forgiveness</u>: See if you qualify for Arrearage Management Plan <u>Gas Assistance Fund</u>: Receive a one-time grant of up to \$100
