**Objective**: The purpose of this course is to provide you with a philosophical framework based upon the philosophy of St. Thomas Aquinas. Knowledge and understanding of Aquinas' philosophy will be acquired through in-depth study of parts of the *Summa Theologica*, with the ultimate goals of helping you learn to see the world as it is, think clearly, and analyze incisively, so that you may come to understand, to be formed by, and to love all that is true, good and beautiful. The class will have succeeded to the extent that you both learn what St. Thomas himself thought as well as become able to do what St. Thomas did (philosophize and theologize yourselves). The time in class will be heavily Socratic, as we dialogue about some of the most fundamental and important issues of human existence.

#### **Course Requirements:**

The requirements for this course consist of regular attendance, completing all assigned readings, coming to class ready to answer questions about the readings, and completion of two papers and two tests. The grade for the Fall Semester will be broken down as follows:

-	Reading Questions/Quizzes	20%
-	Class Participation	10%
-	Paper 1	10%
-	Paper 2	20%
-	Midterm Exam	20%

#### Papers:

Instructions for each paper are as follows. Each paper should be *typed*, *double-spaced*, *Times New Roman 12 pt. font*, *1" margins*. Challenge level students will write longer papers and be graded according to a higher standard of writing and analysis.

**Paper 1** (due **Sept. 24**): Write a 2 page paper in which you expound upon one or two ways that the philosophy and life of St. Thomas were one, based on Peter Kreeft's article. Reflect on how you need to grow, and practical steps that you can take, in order to have the same unity in your own life.

**Paper 2** (due **Dec 3**): Choose one of the following and write a *questio* in which you a) raise objections, b) make your case and then c) answer the objections:

- A. Whether Satan is pure evil.
- B. Whether goodness and being are really different
- C. Whether evil exists as something on its own (i.e. has being)

#### **Exams:**

There will be both a midterm and a final exam. Comprehensive study guides will be given out ahead of time. Exams will consist of 5 sections: definitions, lists, true/false questions, short answer, and your choice of two longer essay answers.
