Scholars seeking to submit a piece to the *N.Y.U. Law Review* must disclose use of artificial intelligence (AI) as part of their submission to NYU Law Review. For more information, please refer to the NYU Law Review's policy on AI. This disclosure template assumes you've read the policy and understand the basic terms it uses to describe AI use (AI, "submitted materials," intentional AI use v. unintentional use, etc.). ***You should spend no more than 10 minutes filling this out.***

We expect scholars to be rigorous in their approach to disclosure, but as the policy notes, scholars need not disclose *every* use of AI. As we note in the policy, one way of thinking about disclosure is: “[S]cholars often credit other scholars or research assistants for substantive or technical contributions to submitted materials. If a scholar has used an AI tool to a similar effect, we expect the scholar to describe that use in the Disclosure Addendum.”
