APPLYING TO KIRTLAND COMMUNITY COLLEGE'S NURSING PROGRAM

	College, or returning after a bit of time away, please complete our <u>Admissions Application</u> . Once processed, you will receive an acceptance letter listing additional actions needed (e.g. copy of officia transcript(s) from your high school and transfer college(s), proof of residence, etc.). It also contains your Kirtland email (Kmail) address that will be used for all official college communications. We encourage frequent monitoring of your Kmail account.
	HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA/GED COMPLETION AND AGE REQUIREMENT: Applicants must have a high school diploma or GED on file with the Registrar's Office. Applicants should verify that their document(s) are on file before applying to the Health Science Program.
	EASE NOTE: Students must be 18 years of age or older by the first day of clinical/internship (**The rsing program begins clinical in the first semester).
_	h school students who desire to apply before achieving their diploma may apply contingent upon achieving and nally submitting their official transcripts to the Registrar's Office 30 days before the semester accepted start date.
	FINANCIAL AID: If you have not already, complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aic (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.gov to determine your eligibility for grants/loans. For more information and/or assistance, visit our Paying for College web page or contact our Financial Aid Office at 989-275-5000 ext. 257, or email FinAid@Kirtland.edu . (Please note that this is completed annually.)

	SCHOLARSHIPS: Kirtland Foundation Scholarships offer a variety of scholarship opportunities for fall and winter semesters. We highly encourage you to <u>apply</u> .
	DECLARE PROGRAM OF STUDY: If you are already a Kirtland student and want to change your current program of study to another program, you will need to complete the <u>Program of Student Update</u> form.
	SCHEDULE AN APPOINTMENT WITH YOUR ACADEMIC ADVISOR: All students must meet with their academic advisor to review prerequisites and develop a program success plan. To schedule ar appointment, you can use the link provided in your Kmail from your advisor, or you may contact Advising at 989-275-5000 ext. 280 or email at stuservice@kirtland.edu .
	PLACEMENT TESTING: If you've been out of high school for longer than ten(10) years, and depending on your high school grade point average (GPA), you may need to complete additional placement testing. Your academic advisor can assist you with determining what, if any, testing may be necessary.

^{*}Additional Note: The timeframe on science prerequisite courses (Medical Terminology, A&P I & II) is accepted if within five years of application to the program. LPN-to-ADN students who have completed A&P I & II with the minimum grade requirement, not within 5 years of application, please contact your academic advisor for options.

<u>Note</u>: If you failed out of another school's nursing program, you must complete an exemption process with the Director of Nursing for consideration of entrance to our program. Please schedule an appointment with an Academic Advisor for support with the process.

- □ JOB SHADOWING: Students who are applying to the Nursing program without direct healthcare experience are strongly encouraged to complete at least 12 hours of job shadowing with a nurse before applying to the Nursing program.
 □ RANKING: This program has a selective ranking process. The ranking of the Nursing programs is based
- on prerequisite course grades, entrance exam scores, essay, and the meet and greet.

 **Students who finish their prerequisite classes before or during the winter semester (before the fall program start) will be ranked in a primary ranking. Students who will finish their prerequisite classes and/or their entrance exam in the summer semester (before the fall program start) are still eligible to be ranked in a secondary ranking process if seats are available.
- □ <u>COMPLETE NURSING PROGRAM APPLICATION</u>: Kirtland's program application window opens January 15th for the upcoming fall and winter programs. Please review the <u>Nursing Application Process Checklist</u> to learn how to apply.

The application deadline for fall admission is May 15th The application deadline for winter admission is September 15th

(<u>Note</u>: Applications received after the deadline are considered late applications. Late applications will be ranked after on-time applications if seats are still available. Completing this application does not signify acceptance into the program.)

☐ MEET AND GREET: As part of the acceptance process, you will be asked to participate in an in-person Meet and Greet session with fellow Nursing school applicants, the Director of Nursing, and Nursing faculty and staff. This is a great opportunity for you to get to know our faculty, and for our faculty to get to know you before beginning the program. To be successful, please dress for success and come ready to participate!
□ ACCEPTANCE/WELCOME LETTERS: Health Sciences will email Acceptance Letters between mid-June and early August (depending on application and prerequisites status) for fall entry, and towards the end of December for winter semester entry. You will need to confirm your seat in the program.
□ COURSE REGISTRATION : Upon acceptance into the program, Health Sciences will register you for your Nursing program courses. If you need to drop/withdraw from a class, it is your responsibility to do so.
☐ MANDATORY ORIENTATION: Date is to be determined (usually within the second week of August for fall, and the first week of January for the winter semester).
□ ACEMAPP : Due by orientation. Additional information and instructions will be provided in your Acceptance/Welcome Letter.
☐ IMMUNIZATIONS, PHYSICAL EXAM, AND BLS: Due by orientation. Additional information regarding Compliance Requirements can be found at this link - Required Abilities and Immunizations. It is highly recommended that you begin collecting your immunization documentation and make sure that your immunizations are up-to-date. These requirements are mandatory to participate in your program's clinical expectations. There is a \$35 out-of-pocket expense for the Student Requirement Management Service. There may be additional costs associated with Immunizations, Physical Exam, and BLS Certification. Information and instructions on how to submit your documentation will be provided in your Acceptance/Welcome Letter.
□ BACKGROUND CHECK & DRUG SCREENING: Due by orientation. This is a \$79.80 out-of-pocket expense. Additional information will be provided in your Acceptance/Welcome Letter. If you feel you might have a criminal background that could hinder your acceptance into the program, we encourage you to reach out to Health Sciences at Nursing HS@kirtland.edu for an evaluation.
