From looking at my first writing piece that we did in this class, I have noticed how scrambled and unorganized my first draft was. The piece has notes all over it, and is actually very hard to read. My drafting process was not the cleanest. Now I look at my most recent writing piece, multi-genre, and I have noticed how much more focused and clean my first draft is.

I finally let my emotions out on paper for the first time and it was overwhelming experience.

It was different knowing our audience was young kids, but it was nice because I had to process the information more thoroughly so I could make it easier to understand.

### As Readers

During third tri I actually pushed past my reading goal and read three books instead of just two.

I notice that when reading now, I tend to look for a good inspirational sports (basketball) book, or a great action-packed and suspenseful fiction book like the Hunger Games. This has changed because normally when I have to read a book for class I try to pick a short, little book so I don't have to consume my time with reading.
