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Abstract

Abstracts are written in English and Indonesian. The abstract should be clear, concise, and descriptive. The abstract should stand alone, means that no citation and figures and equation format in the abstract. Consider it the advertisement of your article. The abstract should tell the prospective reader what you did and highlight the key findings. This abstract should provide a brief background of the problem (preferably 1-2 sentences), clear objective of paper, research method in short, and a brief summary of results/findings, and short conclusion. Avoid using technical jargon and uncommon abbreviations. You must be accurate, brief, clear and specific. Use words which reflect the precise meaning. The abstract should be precise and honest. Please follow word limitations (100-150 words) and written in one paragraph (maximum 150 words), font Lato, size 11, spaced 1

Keyword: *Keywords contain basic ideas or concepts that represent the field under study. Keywords maximum of 5 ideas or concepts*

INTRODUCTION

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The Journal of Education Research provides a forum for publishing original research articles, review articles from contributors, and reports on new technologies related to education. All manuscripts submitted to this journal must be written in proper Indonesian or English. The work must not have been published or submitted for publication elsewhere.

In the Introduction section, authors should clearly state the objective of the paper at the end of the introduction. Prior to stating the objective, authors must provide a concise background (maximum one paragraph), and a very brief literature review to highlight existing solutions or methods, identify the best among previous studies, point out major limitations in earlier research, indicate the intended contribution (to address the identified limitations), and highlight the scientific value or novelty of the article. Avoid a detailed literature survey or summary of results. Do not describe the literature review as individual authors, but rather group the reviewed articles by method or topic, referring to multiple sources. (Writing from the Introduction to the Conclusion section should use Lato font, size 11, single spacing.)

RESEARCH METHOD

The method section should enable readers to clearly understand the research methodology employed. Provide sufficient detail to ensure the work can be comprehended and replicated. The described methods must be supported by references; only relevant modifications should be explained. Do not repeat established methodological details. This section should include the research design or framework. It encompasses the

type of research, the research subjects/objects, data collection techniques or instruments, and data analysis methods. It should also be complemented with illustrations such as diagrams or charts depicting the research design and procedural steps.

RESULTS AND DISCUSSIONS

The results should be clear and concise. They should summarize the scientific findings rather than present detailed data. Please highlight the differences between your results or findings and those previously published by other researchers. The discussion should explore the significance of the research findings, rather than merely restating them. A combined Results and Discussion section is often appropriate. Avoid citations and extensive discussion of previously published literature.

The Discussion is the most critical part of your article. This is where you have the opportunity to present the value of your data. Structure your discussion to align with your results, but do not repeat them. It often begins with a brief summary of the main scientific findings (not experimental results).

The following components should be covered in the discussion:

- a) How do your results relate to the initial research questions or objectives outlined in the Introduction? What are your research findings? (what/how?)
- b) Do you provide scientific interpretations for each result or finding presented? These interpretations should be supported by valid analysis and characterization (why?)
- c) Are your results consistent with those previously reported by other scholars? Or are there any differences?

Table

Tables should be numbered consecutively, with the table number and title placed above the table. Tables must be centered either within the column or on the page. A line spacing of 12 pt should follow each table. Table elements should be single-spaced; however, double spacing may be used to indicate grouping of data or to separate sections within the table. Table titles should be in bold, 10 pt font. Tables should be referred to in the text by their number only, without directional cues (e.g., above, below, following). For example: Table 1. Do not display vertical lines in the table. Only horizontal lines should be used within the table.

Figures

Figures should be numbered consecutively starting from 1, with the figure title and number placed below the figure, as shown in Figure 1. Detailed recommendations for figures are as follows:

- a) Ensure that the figures are clear and legible with typed text.
- b) Both black-and-white and colored figures are acceptable.
- c) If a figure spans two columns, it should be placed at the top or bottom of the page.
- d) Hard-copy illustrations should be scanned and included in the electronic version of the submission in an appropriate format.
- e) If a figure cannot be scanned, the original should be inserted in its intended position within the manuscript.

CONCLUSION

The conclusion should solely address the research objectives. It should explain how your study advances the field from the current state of knowledge. Without a clear conclusion, reviewers and readers will find it difficult to assess the work and determine whether it is suitable for publication in the journal. Do not repeat the abstract or merely list experimental results. Provide a clear scientific justification for your research and highlight its potential applications and extensions. The conclusion must be presented as a paragraph. You should also suggest future experiments and/or indicate ongoing studies. The conclusion should not exceed 100 words.
