General Summer School Information

We are pleased to announce our list of summer school opportunities for 2025. Students have an opportunity to participate in a wide variety of activities.

Eligibility: All students living within the School District of Hillsboro boundaries or who are currently open enrolled in the School District of Hillsboro are eligible to attend the summer school program.

Please keep in mind that staffing is based on your registration. *The School District of Hillsboro reserves the right to cancel classes or activities due to low enrollment.*

Food Service: Hillsboro School District will be offering breakfast and lunch to all children who are 18 years of age or younger. The summer food service program provides an opportunity to provide continued nutritional meals to students. Meals are free to all kids and teens. You do not have to be eligible for free and reduced meals to participate in this program. You do not need to attend summer school to participate in the Summer Food Service Program.

Breakfast will be served in the Elementary school: 8:15 AM - 9:00 AM. **Lunch** will be served in the Elementary school: 11:45 AM - 12:30 PM.

Elementary Summer School

(Transportation will be offered for both of these elementary summer school sessions. Fill out this <u>form</u> to request a pickup or drop off by May 23.)

Drop Off and Pick Up: Bus drop off and pick up will be in the bus loading zone, which is the lower grades playground blacktop. All other traffic will use the front loop/main office entrance.

Arrival: Students may arrive for summer school beginning at 8:30 a.m. and will go directly to the cafeteria. Breakfast will be available at this time. Students will be dismissed from the cafeteria at 8:55 and classes will begin at 9:00.

Dismissal: Students will be dismissed from summer school at 11:55. Lunch will be available at this time. Those students choosing not to eat lunch at school may leave or get picked up. All students choosing to eat lunch will go to the cafeteria. Students will be dismissed from the cafeteria at 12:25. Buses will leave at 12:30.

Walking or Biking: Students walking or biking to and from summer school should stay on designated routes determined by parents. Students must go directly home or to their designated location immediately following summer school dismissal.

Absences: If your child is going to be absent from summer school, please call the elementary school office at 608-489-2224 in advance or by 9:00 a.m. the day of the absence.

Student Behavior: It is expected that all students behave in a respectful, responsible, and safe manner while attending summer school. Misbehavior may result in a student not being allowed to attend summer school.

COURSE OFFERINGS: INCOMING GRADES K-5

Incoming K-2 Students:

K-2 summer school provides an exciting and engaging opportunity for young learners to explore a variety of activities, including art projects, while reinforcing essential math and reading fundamentals. Students will work on building key skills that will prepare them for the upcoming school year, ensuring they feel confident and ready. With a mix of creative and academic activities, it's the perfect way to learn, grow, and have fun this summer!

Incoming 3-5 Students will rotate through these courses:

Camp Lit: Literacy Camp is designed to provide effective and engaging lessons that focus on developing each child's inherent strengths while assuring access to quality reading materials. Students will benefit from a powerful combination of lessons and joyful camp experiences that will help children grow as readers, writers, and learners. (Ms. Larson)

Bookin' & Cookin': The students will listen to a story and then draw and/or write about their favorite part of the book. They will make a recipe inspired by the story. Example: After listening to "Skippy Jon Jones" students will make Cheesy Quesadillas. Yum! (Mrs. Wunsch)

Hunter's Safety Education

June 16, 17, 18 - 8:30 - 11:30 Hillsboro High School. June 19 - 9 AM - 1:00 PM Field Day at Kendall Sportsman's Club

Cost: \$10.00 (required by the DNR)

Anyone born after Jan.1, 1974 is required to take a Hunter's Education course to hunt legally in Wisconsin.

Course Objectives: This course follows the WI DNR curriculum and gives students the knowledge and skills to be safe and responsible hunters. Emphasis is placed on safety and responsibility. Instructors reserve the right to expel any students who do not follow basic rules of conduct or participate in horseplay.

Students will also need to register with DNR. All Wisconsin recreational safety students are required to obtain a **Wisconsin DNR Customer ID Number** when registering for a safety education class and must provide that number to their instructor. You can obtain a DNR Customer ID Number by calling the DNR customer service from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. at 1-888-936-7463 or go to Go Wild Wisconsin and create a new account.

Class size is limited.

ATV Safety Education

For students in grades 5-12

Cost: \$10.00 (required by the DNR)

Course Objectives: This course follows the WI DNR curriculum and gives students the knowledge and skills to be safe and responsible ATV drivers. Emphasis is placed on safety and responsibility.

Students will also need to register with DNR. All Wisconsin recreational safety students are required to obtain a **Wisconsin DNR Customer ID Number** when registering for a safety education class and must provide that number to their instructor. You can obtain a DNR Customer ID Number by calling the DNR customer service from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. at 1-888-936-7463. Or go to Go Wild Wisconsin and create a new account.

High School Courses

Driver's Education

The basics of Driver's Education in the state of Wisconsin consist of the following: Thirty hours of classroom instruction, six hours of behind-the-wheel, and six hours of observation. All instruction is provided by teachers with Wisconsin driver's education certification. Students must have 50 hours of driving before age 16 years.

Any student can enroll in this course if they are turning 15 years old during the school year. **Exception:** Anyone turning 15 before March of the following school year may enroll and take the classroom during the summer. When they turn 15, they can begin driving behind the wheel.

There are two sessions of driver's education.

- <u>Classroom-based</u>: Classes will take place in the High School. The classroom instruction must be attended and passed to take your State Knowledge Test. Students taking the classroom session must attend **every** session for the **entire** class.
- 2. <u>Virtual</u>: Students will use a Chromebook to complete coursework. Due dates must be followed and assignments passed to take your State Knowledge Test.

American Red Cross Lifeguarding

Lifeguarding class is approximately 27 hours (or longer if more practice is needed) and includes both online and in-person instruction. The online work, which takes around 6 hours, must be completed prior to the start of the class. The remaining time is spent on lifeguarding skills, first aid, and CPR. Class will be held in June and/or July and will be determined based on student schedules.

To take the class, students must first pass a pretest (see below for details). Students must be 15 years old by the conclusion of the class.

Students must complete the following to pass the class:

- Attend all classes.
- Pass a multiple-choice test (50 questions) with a score of 80% or higher.
- Successfully demonstrate all rescue skills.
- Complete three final skills assessments:
 - o Rotate in--conduct surveillance--rotate out
 - o Timed single-rescuer CPR scenario
 - o Multiple rescuer response scenario

The cost is approximately \$115 (exact amount TBD), which includes the following:

- Red Cross certification fee (\$50)
- Lifeguard manual (\$32)
- CPR mask (around \$10)
- Whistle (around \$5)
- Hip pack (around \$15)

Lifeguarding Course Prerequisite Skills

<u>Prerequisite 1:</u> Complete a swim-tread-swim sequence without stopping to rest:

- Jump into the water and totally submerge, resurface, then swim 150 yards using the front crawl, breaststroke, or a combination of both. Swimming on the back or side is not permitted.
 Students must swim with their face in the water, demonstrating rhythmic breathing. Swim goggles are allowed.
- Maintain position at the surface of the water for 2 minutes by treading water using only the legs.
- Swim 50 yards using the front crawl, breaststroke, or a combination of both.

Prerequisite 2: Complete a timed event within 1 minute, 40 seconds:

- Starting in the water, swim 20 yards. (The face may be in or out of the water. Swim goggles are not allowed.)
- Surface dive (feet-first or head-first) to a depth of 7 10 feet to retrieve a 10-pound object.
- Return to the surface and swim 20 yards on the back to return to the starting point, holding the object at the surface with both hands and keeping the face out at or near the surface.
- Exit the water without using a ladder or steps.
