

One Snowy Day: A Winter Weather Book For Kids

- “Spinning and twirling...” Can you spin and twirl like a snowflake to the next post?
- “The house is all quiet...” Pretend to be a playful puppy. Leap up with a joyful bark and wag your tail as you walk to the next post.
- “Two sleepy children...” Take a minute to stretch your arms and legs just like the two sleepy children in the story before you walk to the next post.
- “The snow coats...” Look closely at the pictures and count how many trees you can find. Point them out to your grown-up!
- “Some cheering and dancing...” Put on your imaginary snow boots and stomp to the next post like the characters in the book.
- “Dragging a sled...” Can you remember a time when you went sledding with your friends? Tell your grown-up about it as you walk to the next post!
- “Seven sleds glide...” Can you speed to the next post like you’re sledding down a snowy hill?
- “Falling back...” Can you move your arms like you’re carving a snow angel into the snow as you walk to the next post?
- “Packing and piling...” Create 10 perfect imaginary snowballs and toss them gently in the air. Count as you toss each one!
- “Placing nine buttons...” Pretend like you are trying to catch the bandit. Chase him as fast as you can to the next post!
- “...with seven scarves blowing...” Let your arms dangle behind you like scarves and laugh as you run with the wind to the next post!
- “Six silver lampposts...” Pretend to be one of the six silver lampposts. Can you bend and sway like a lamppost in the wind?
- “Three faces warmed...” Imagine you are holding a cup of cocoa. Take a sip and pretend it warms you up. Can you tell your grown-up how it tastes?

- “And one sleepy puppy...” Pretend to snuggle up tight like the sleepy puppy in the story. Close your eyes and take a moment to rest.
- “While spinning and twirling...” Stick out your tongue and pretend you are catching fluffy and light snowflakes on it as you twirl to the next post.
- “...fall all through the night.” Thank you for reading with us! See if you can find and observe things to count on your next snowy day!
