Manias, Panics, and Crashes: A History of Financial Crises, Seventh Edition Paperback – Oct 13 2015 by [Charles P. Kindleberger](#) (Author), [Robert Z. Aliber](#) (Author) (one of the harder books that I had to read, very informative but language heavy on financial and not easy to read or maybe I was not in the right state of mind while reading ... will have to re-read at some point, but the gist of the book I definitely got)

Market Sense and Nonsense, Jack Schwager (Discussion of the deficient market hypothesis - markets do have periods of inefficiency; the problem with past returns, a great chapter on measurement of risk, hidden risk, volatility vs risk, leveraged etfs pitfalls, track record pitfalls, Pro Forma

makes no sense - going backward is easy to construct great funds, correlation facts and fallacies; great introduction to Hedge Funds and its origin (Mr. Jones) early 1960's; leverage fallacy, diversification, robin hood investing (rebalancing)

What I learned losing a million dollars - Jim Paul and Brendan Moynihan

Einstein's Mistakes, The Human Failings of Genius, Hans C. Ohanian (incredible book for anyone who likes physics, math, or engineering. I loved this read both for its biographical content and the physics aspect. The number of scientists in this book is crazy! Discussion on Aristotle, Galileo, Copernicus, Newton, Planck, Maxwell, Lorentz, Reimann, and the list goes on and on and on, just amazing! The pointing out of mistakes and failures of Einstein is a great reminder that genius is no different from our normal lives we live. Amazing ending quote: "The genius - like a child - has rebellious, questioning attitude and also an uncanny ability to look at things from a fresh perspective to achieve unexpected insights. As Baudeliare expressed it: Genius is no more than childhood recaptured at will ... And of course, children do make mistakes". Awesome reminder of learning from mistakes along our paths!

The Tao of Charlie Munger, David Clark (wonderful list of around 100 or so quotes with respect to investing, life, philosophy, learning, etc from Charlie, a very nice quote from Louis Vincenti "Tell the truth, and you won't have to remember your lies"; do not multitask have time for deep thought about subjects, many many topics worth reading and re-reading this book)

A Brief History of Time, Stephen Hawking (2017 updated version) - (physics on an abstract level, but very fun to read and fascinating topics: black holes, time, uncertainty principle, black holes not so black and what happens around them, event horizon, expanding universe, some thoughts on unification of physics, talk between gravitational and quantum ideas. Very cool to read and grasp numerous topics for the first time!). Also started a book "black holes" but did not get into it so not on this list.

Sleep, Nick Littlehales (good topics of R90 program, 90min cycles, 35 cycles a week ideal, napping/resting, pre-post sleep routines, picking a mattress, melatonin and serotonin release for adults, teens, reason why teens like to stay up and wake up later, position to sleep in - side on non-dominant side, neat book and very fast read)

Warren Buffett's Ground Rules - Jeremy C. Miller (What an amazing book! Definitely a must buy and must re-read again. Covers Warren's Partnership years from 1950's into closing in later 60's. The integrity of this man is incredible and admirable, inspired me to continue having "honesty" as one

of my key values in life to live by. First sense of valuing companies found here as well)

Warren Buffett's Annual Shareholder letters (77-84) - a must read for any wisdom seeking investor!

The road less traveled - M. Scott Peck (one of the better books on spiritual growth - Several key sections to this book. The first section on discipline with regards to: delaying gratification, taking full responsibility for own actions/success, living in reality/truth/honesty, balancing these previous three e.g. one must balance honesty and when to properly and wisely use it for overall good. Balancing is really hard, in fact all discipline is really hard! The next section on Love is amazing and really points out what true love is and the amount of work it takes to continuously have love in one's life. Very few people are willing to work and be as courageous to search out for love on a daily basis. The section on Growth and Religion points out key items how people can grow out of and back into faith and religion and that not all people will follow (or even need) the same path. Finally Grace is an awesome chapter, even for those who believe or do not believe in God. The reality as I think and as the author seems to portray is that God's grace comes to us when we are not searching for it, but yet will have the courage to follow the search living by love (extending oneself for self and for others). The comparison to original sin to entropy and laziness is a wonderful comparison and certainly key to all of us. A great book extremely thankful to Nancy who recommended it to me. A must buy and must re-read in the future!

The Little Book that Still Beats the market, Joel Greenblatt (a great little book that captures the essence of value in comparison to return on capital and earnings yield. The author explains the difficulty in knowing and utilizes a diversified field of about 30 stocks that fit the two latter criteria to the best estimates. Once the 30 businesses are chosen based on the criteria then each year shares are sold and new 30 are found. To avoid taxes losses are sold before the end of the 1 year cycle to get income tax break and gains are sold after the 1 year holding period to take advantage of the capital gains tax. No easy road here and this is a blind search and even a website is provided: magicformulainvesting.com where the 30 or 50 stocks are found for you. Of course the hardest thing in this is to stick to the formula over a very long time (ideally infinite) as the formula over the long run does out do the market, but over some stretches can underperform badly. There is a wonderful story in the beginning of the book on explaining the concepts behind return on capital and earnings yield via a bubble gum story of a school kid. The book was written in a way that Joel's kids should have understood the book, but my opinion is that it will take a bit of work to understand the key concepts. The following

formula is simple, but is extremely difficult to implement in the long term and that is why the author believes that it will not be used by most people. Will buy this book to re-read in the new year.

Predictably irrational – Dan Ariely:

- **Relativity – why everything is relative**
- **Fallacy of Supply and Demand – why the price of pearls and everything else is up in the air**
- **The cost of ZERO! Why we pay too much when we pay nothing**
- **The cost of Social Norms – why we are happy to do things, but not when we are paid to do them**
- **Influence of Arousal – why hot is much hotter than we realize**
- **The problem of procrastination and self-control – why we can't make ourselves do what we want to do?**

- **how much do we lose when our fleeting impulses deflect us from our long-term goals?**
- **How much is our health affected by those missed appointments and our lack of exercise?**
- **How much is our wealth reduced when we forget our vow to save more and consume less?**
- **Why do we lose the fight against procrastination so frequently?**
- **Here we are always good in the future, but in the present we cannot follow through ... yet, we don't live in the future!**

- **High price of ownership – why we overvalue what we have**
- **Keeping doors OPEN!!! Why options distract us from our main objective**
- **The effect of expectations – why the mind gets what it expects**
- **Power of price – why a 50 cent aspirin can do what a penny aspirin cannot**
- **Why we are dishonest?! How easily we cheat, steal, lie ... recall robbery example vs fraud at workplace**
- **Why dealing with cash makes us more honest?**
