readers to analyze character development, predict outcomes, and connect with the story on a more personal level. It also helps students build empathy, perspective-taking, and critical thinking skills as they engage with the text.

• Good readers figure out the author's message by carefully analyzing the text and making connections between different elements. They consider the characters, events, and themes in the story, as well as the author's choice of language, tone, and perspective. Through this analysis, readers can identify the underlying meaning, moral, or lesson that the author wants to convey. Good readers also draw on their own experiences, background knowledge, and critical thinking skills to interpret the text and derive the author's intended message.

- Readers identify the common elements threaded throughout trickster tales, folktales and fables.

- What the characters say and do helps you understand how they feel about each other and what they really want.
- The words and illustrations show how a character looks.
- The character's thoughts show what he is like on the inside.
- The character's dialogue shows what she is like on the inside.
- The character's behavior shows what she is like on the inside.
- Sometimes characters make mistakes.
- Sometimes characters learn a lesson in the story.
- Sometimes characters change because of things that happen to them.
- Sometimes different characters learn the same lesson.
- Trickster tales are alike in many ways and define it.
- The main character outsmarts the other characters.
- The main character is smaller or weaker and the other characters are bigger or stronger.
- Trickster tales have a lesson in the end.

- Fantasy stories often happen in an unusual place
- Normal object and things can become magical in fantasy stories
