The Northwest Journalists of Color Scholarship

For nearly 30 years, the Northwest Journalists of Color have coordinated scholarships for aspiring journalists. The NJC's members belong to the Asian American Journalists Association (AAJA), Black Journalists Association of Seattle (BJAS), National Association of Hispanic Journalists (NAHJ) and the Native American Journalists Association (NAJA). Since 1983, the NJC and AAJA have given more than \$150,000 in scholarships.

You do not need to identify as a student of color to apply for this scholarship. Strong preference will be given to applicants who demonstrate an understanding of and commitment to the importance of diverse cultural backgrounds and experiences in newsrooms.

What scholarship winners receive:

- Scholarship money to students who intend to pursue careers in journalism
- An invitation to an awards ceremony and reception in early June attended by other media professionals in the area
- A professional journalist mentor

You are eligible if you meet at least one of the following requirements:

- You are a current high school junior or senior attending school in Washington
- You are a graduating high school senior attending school in Washington and planning to attend a Washington or out-of-state four-year college, community college or vocational college in the fall
- You are a current student attending a four-year college, community college or vocational college in Washington
