The Vespasian Warner Library has fairies.

Former maintenance man Dave Ward noticed the first fairy door in 2018. It's located on the Children's floor next to the entrance to the Museum Room. The tear-drop shaped door is flanked by two little trees.

The second door was discovered soon after next to the entrance to Periodicals. This little dark brown door features two potted plants and a cute little doormat.

And finally, the third door was discovered in Periodicals, situated on the shelf above the mystery movies. The green door has a window with a purple frame, stairs with a branch for a handrail, and two butterfly chairs at the bottom of the stairs.

This is the only door with a number: 310 in roman numerals. And there's a little bunny statue on the stairs.

The fairies like to use things they find around the library to decorate their doors and their spaces. This is most noticeable outside of Periodicals. The fairies there have claimed the nearby potted plant as their play space. They've hung a hammock and acquired a little table and matching chairs. The fairies like to decorate this space, usually for the holidays. They've hung shamrock lights, put up Christmas decorations, had bunnies over for Easter, and have even attracted the most adorable swarm of bees.

Notoriously shy, the fairies stay out of sight while there are patrons in the building, preferring to come out and play once everyone is gone.

But this doesn't mean that the fairies don't like our patrons! They would actually love to hear from you. The fairies have their own mailbox above the fairy door next to the Periodicals entrance. We encourage patrons to write them a letter and leave it in their mailbox. The fairies love to get mail and sometimes will even write back!

On the children's floor, you can find many stories about all kinds of fairies. In the non-fiction section of the adult floor, you'll find several creative books about fairies, including cross stitching and polymer clay, in the craft and hobbies section.

However, if you're looking to attract more fairies into your life, perhaps the most useful book is *Fairy Homes and Gardens* by Barbara Purchia and E. Ashley Rooney. It's believed that if you build homes for fairies, they'll move in. The book contains dozens of pictures of fairy homes of all different types. There are houses for gardens and meadows, woodlands, and the water.

Some houses reflect the fairy tales we grew up reading. Others illustrate the fairy community, such as an orthodontist office, a commune, a nursery, a bakery, and even a music venue. It also shows how much fairies love to decorate for the holidays—which we at the library already know- and all of the décor and furniture needed to create a comfortable fairy house.

And of course, there's a whole chapter on fairy doors. Perhaps creating one yourself might just invite some fairies into your own home.

In 2022, our library fairies made a technological leap. They began blogging! Morgan, Echo, and Weatherby decided it was time to introduce themselves to a wider audience. They use their blog to talk about the happenings around the library, from a fairy perspective. They've talked about Summer Reading, the new pollinator garden, 12 days of Crafts, and even the new local history section. They even blogged about investigating the mystery of who caused the mess outside of Morgan's fairy door

on the main floor. There were several suspects, but in the end, the party responsible was correctly identified.

The blog also features plenty of pictures and though the fairies aren't in any of them (remember they are shy), their friends Snickers the Gargoyle and Dozer the Dragon are happy to mug for the camera.
