# **Key Vocabulary and Resources**

### **Common Types of Postsecondary Options**

- 1. <u>Gap Year/Other Bridge Program</u>: A semester or year of experiential learning, typically taken after high school and prior to career or postsecondary education, in order to deepen one's practical, professional, and personal awareness. A few examples include <u>City Year</u> and <u>Americorps</u>.
- **2. Apprenticeship Program:** Combines hands-on work (income) with classroom instruction (learning) in the aspects of a skilled profession. Click <a href="here">here</a> for more information.
- **3.** <u>Paid/Unpaid Internship</u>: A professional learning experience that offers meaningful, practical work related to a student's field of study or career interest. Click here for a list of local internships: <u>One Degree</u>
- **4. Credentialing:** An industry-recognized credential is a verification of an individual's qualification or competence. Industry-recognized credentials are valued in the labor market and are a validation of knowledge and skill. They can take many forms, including certifications, certificates, and licenses, and are often connected to regional labor market trends.
- 5. Job Training or Non-degree Granting Certification Program: Programs aimed at opening the door to entry-level employment pathways and/or giving a boost to workers' employability and earnings. See One Degree for training programs in New York City, Many Pathways, One Goal (a comprehensive database of career/skills training programs in New York City), Alternatives to College: Comprehensive Youth Development. CUNY offers a wide range of certificate programs.
- **6.** Workforce Development Program: Programs that provide employment and technical skills training linked here.
- **7. Employment**: A paid work agreement between an employer and employee. Read about different employment industries **HERE**.
- **8.** <u>College</u>: Enrollment in two or four-year accredited degree granting programs. Learn about the different types of colleges at <u>Learning to Use Big Future</u>
- **9.** <u>Independent Living Skills Program</u>: Supports for young people with developmental disabilities: life-skills training/support coupled with job coaching. <u>Transition Support and Options Resources</u>
- **10.** <u>Military</u>: Enlistment in one of the five military service branches- (Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, or Coast Guard) <u>Military Information</u> and the <u>ASVAB test</u>

- Complete at least one interest inventory like <u>Exploring Your Career Interests</u>
- Take <u>virtual tours of college campuses and company headquarters</u> to learn more about specific options that match your interests and goals.
- Interview adults you interact with at school or in the community about their postsecondary pathways. Some sample questions you can ask are:
  - O What were you doing at my age?
  - O What do you do now?
  - O How did you decide what postsecondary path to follow?
  - What things should I think about when I'm choosing my own postsecondary path?
  - O How did you view your future at my age? How do you view it now?
  - What advice would you give to somebody my age?
  - How would you describe your schooling experience?
  - What was the best job you ever had and why?
