

WHICH FRAME?

Purpose

This activity will help you consider how the frames relate to early human history. Making a prediction before learning new content not only helps you draw upon your previous knowledge, it jump-starts your thinking for the upcoming lesson.

Process

1. Use three different colors to highlight the portions of the statements below that reference the three frames: networks, production and distribution, and communities. (If you don't have highlighters, you can use the letters N, P&D, and C to indicate which portions go with which frame).
 - The development of language is instrumental to human history.
 - The earliest human societies originated in Africa and migrated into Eurasia, the Pacific, and the Americas.
 - Farming enabled early humans to build permanent settlements.
 - Early farmers suffered from more diseases than their foraging counterparts.
 - Archaeologists study bones, stone tools, and weapons to learn about human history.
2. Now, make a prediction: Which of the three frames will be most important in enabling human migration around the world?
