- Offer an introduction to open textbook publishing for people who aren't sure where to start.
- Share resources and recommendations while building community.
- Provide a foundation for a variety of publishing pathways and platforms.

Introduction

Pub101 is a free, informal, online orientation to open textbook publishing. Together we will explore Units 1-5 in the <u>Open Education Network Publishing Curriculum</u>, which includes adaptable resources and templates. You'll hear from colleagues who have worked on open textbook publishing projects and what they've learned. After completing Pub101, eligible members will be invited to join the Publishing Cooperative for ongoing support and benefits.

Who is Pub101 for?

Pub101 is open to Open Education Network members. Consortia may extend this invitation to their institutions. Pub101 is designed for librarians, instructional designers and anyone else who may be supporting authors in writing an open textbook. It focuses on what's involved in supporting and managing a publishing project or program, rather than how to write a textbook or use a particular publishing platform.

Outcomes

- 1. Evaluate your capacity to support OER publishing at your institution.
- 2. Identify common steps of the publishing process, including roles and responsibilities in preproduction and production.
- 3. Explain project management methods for communicating with authors, managing expectations and ensuring timely production cycles.

There are also optional assignments that give you an opportunity to practice what you've learned and build assets for your publishing program.
